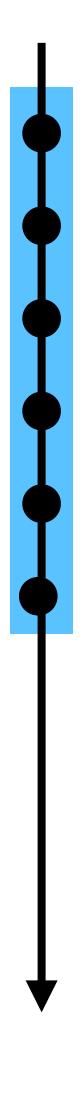

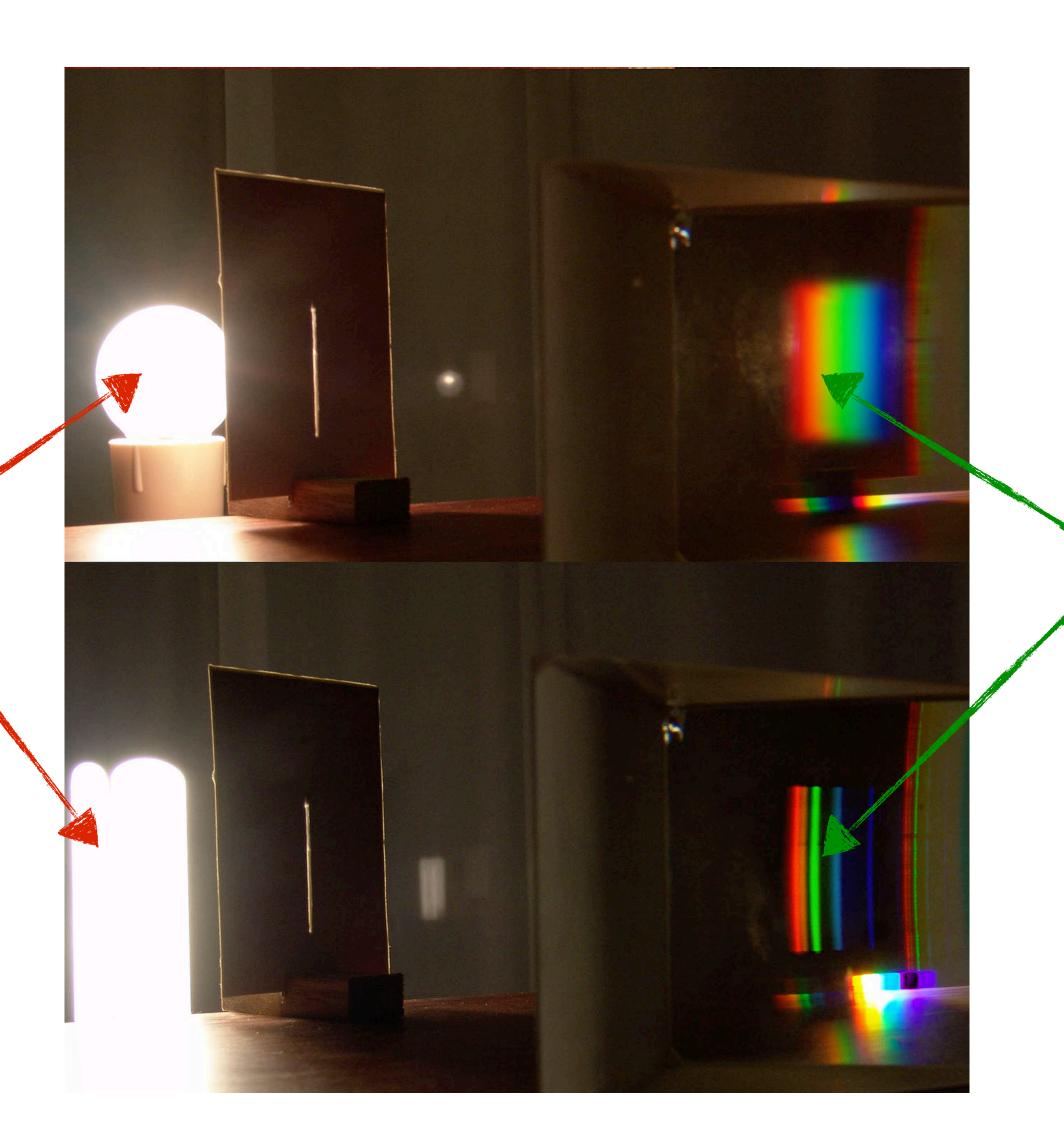

The two lights have similar apparent color, but are they the same light?



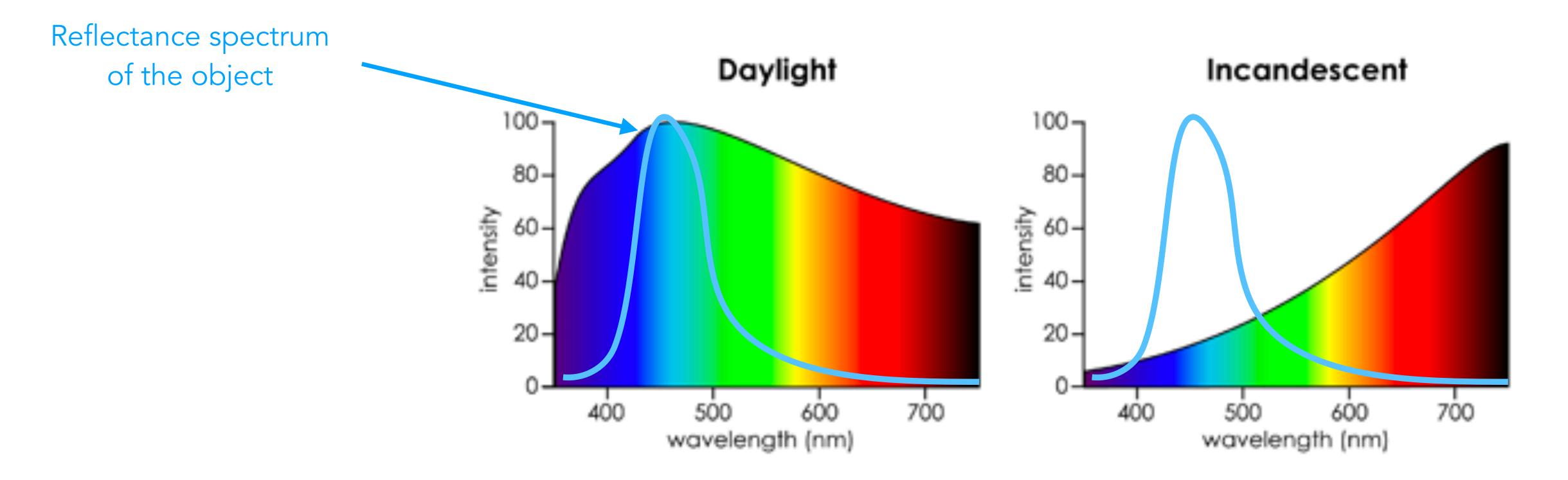
No! Lights with the same apparent color could have very different spectra.

Do Spectra Ever Matter?

To reveal the "true color" of an object, the light source needs to emit wavelengths that the object reflects.

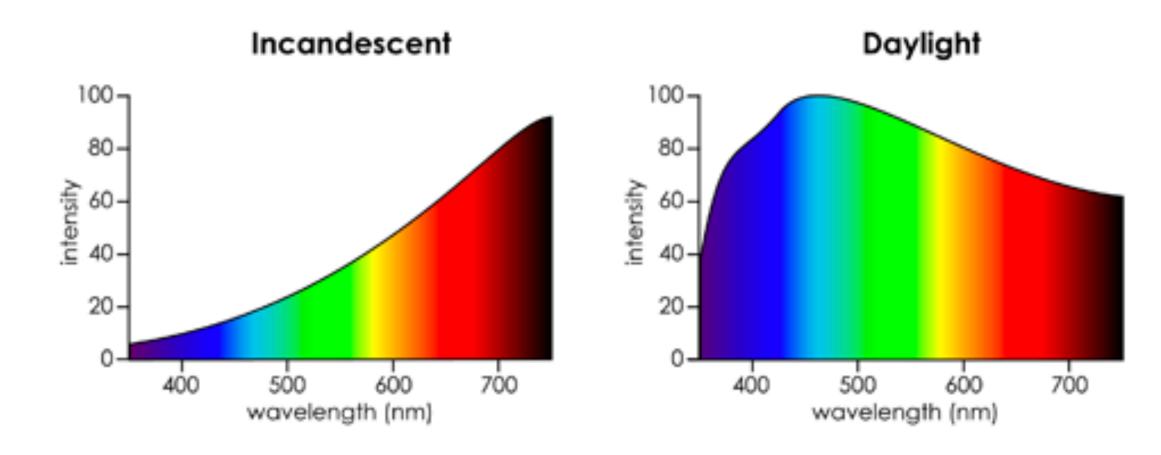
Color Rendering

- The reference light is:

 - A standard illuminant D (some form of **daylight**) when CCT is above 5000K.

Color rendering concerns with the ability of a light source to reveal the "true color" of an object, which is the color of an object under a "reference" light. • The choice of reference light is somewhat arbitrary, but it's generally white, e.g., daylight.

A blackbody radiation (some form of incandescent light) when CCT is below 5000K.

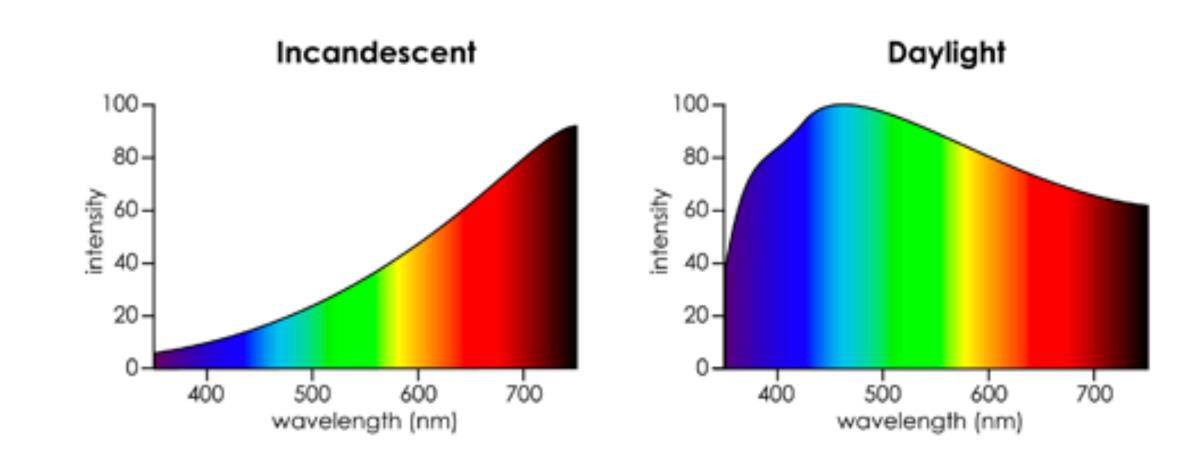


Color Rendering Index (CRI)

A metric standardized by CIE.

reference light under the same correlated color temperature.

- CRI is defined only for light sources that are approximate white, i.e., the chromaticity distance to the Planckian locus is below a threshold.
- **CRI** quantifies the coloring rendering capability of a given light source w.r.t., a



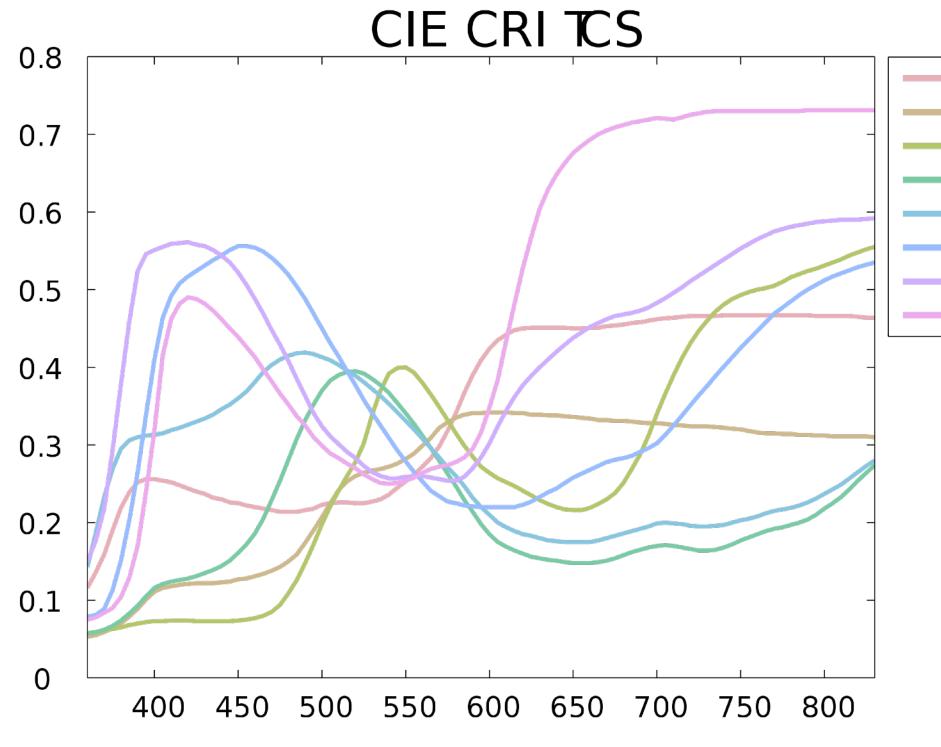


Calculating Color Rendering Index (CRI)

Pick a set of calibration materials with given spectral reflectance.

For each material, illuminate it with both the test light and the reference light. Calculate the two sets of xy-chromaticities, apply von Kries chromatic adaption, and calculate the distance in the xy diagram.

Take some form of average across the samples and normalize to 100.

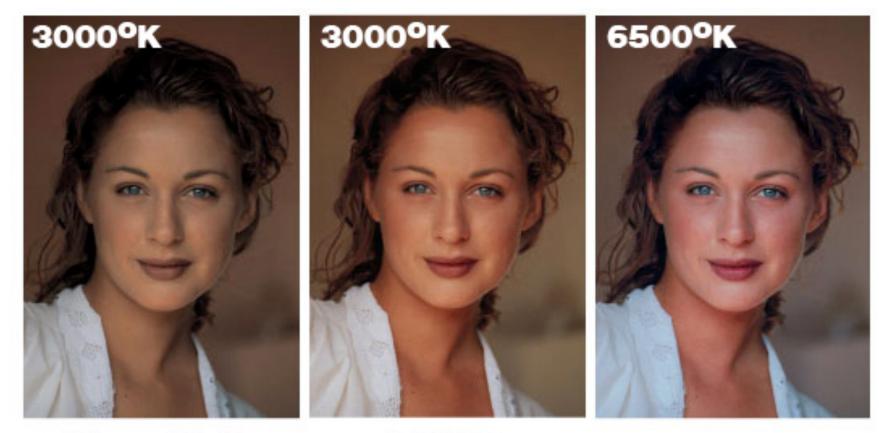
Interpreting CRI

Lights that are more similar to the reference lights (incandescent or daylight) have higher CRIs. Reference lights have a CRI of 100.

Generally, lights with continuous spectra have higher CRIs.

• A continuous spectrum better integrates across the entire visible range.

Display vs. Lighting

We directly look at lights from the display.

• Reproducing the color (using metamerism) is key. Spectrum is not important.

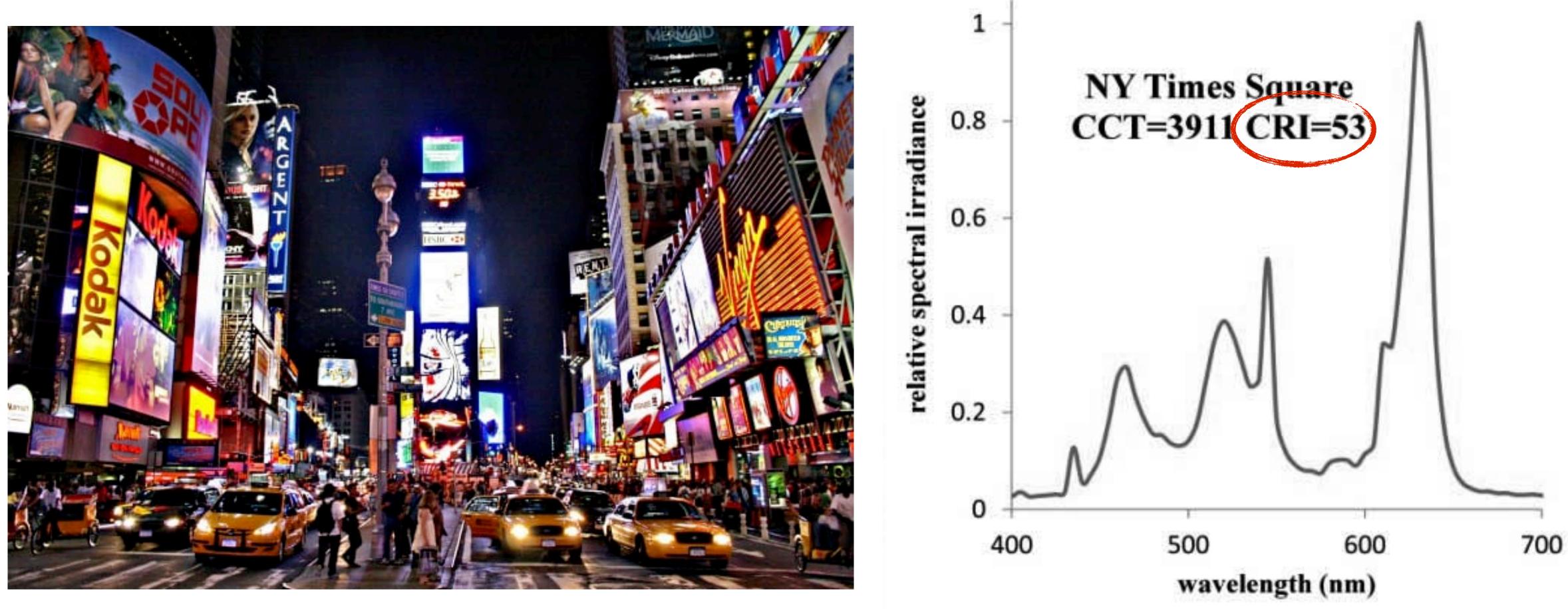

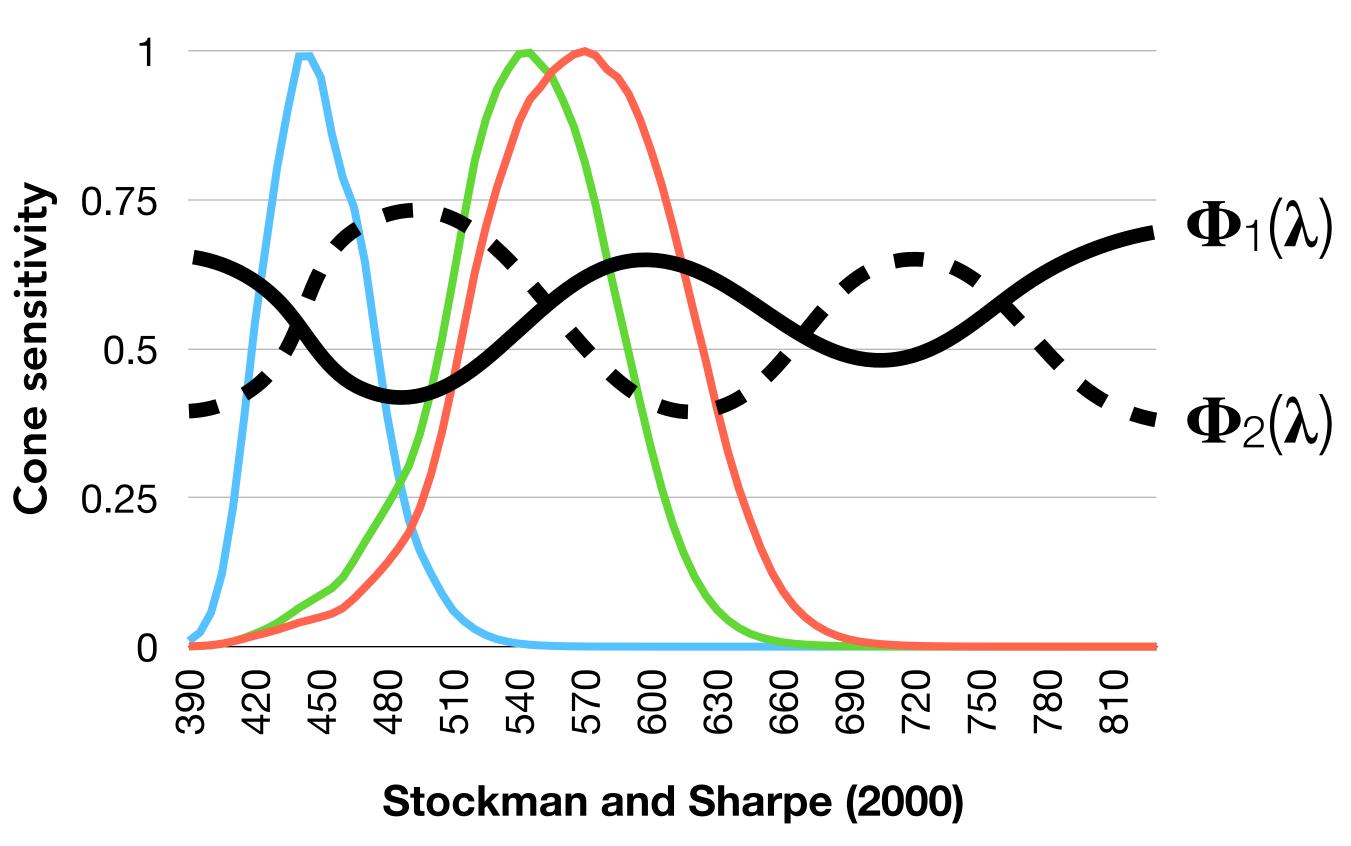

Recall: Metamerism

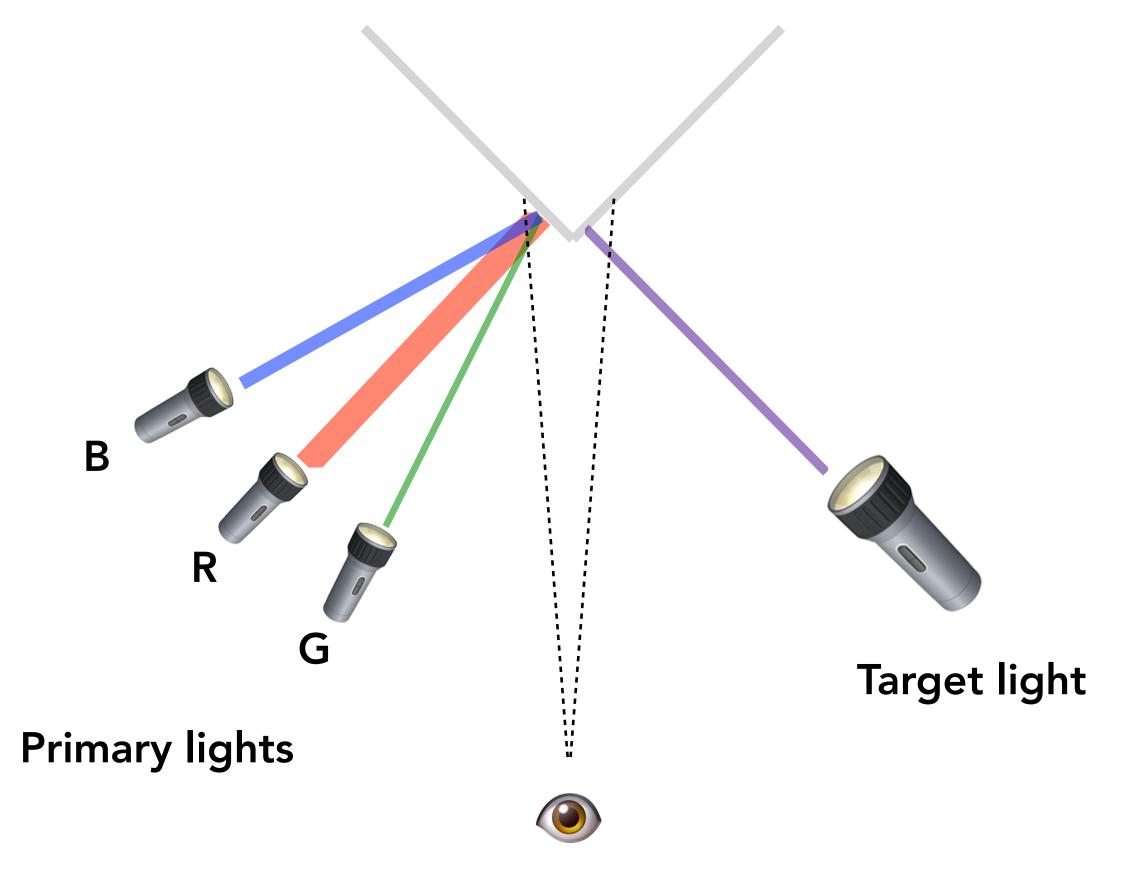
The two lights are metamers of each other if their LMS responses match.

Recall: Trichromatic Theory of Color



We can match the color of a given light by mixing three primary colors.

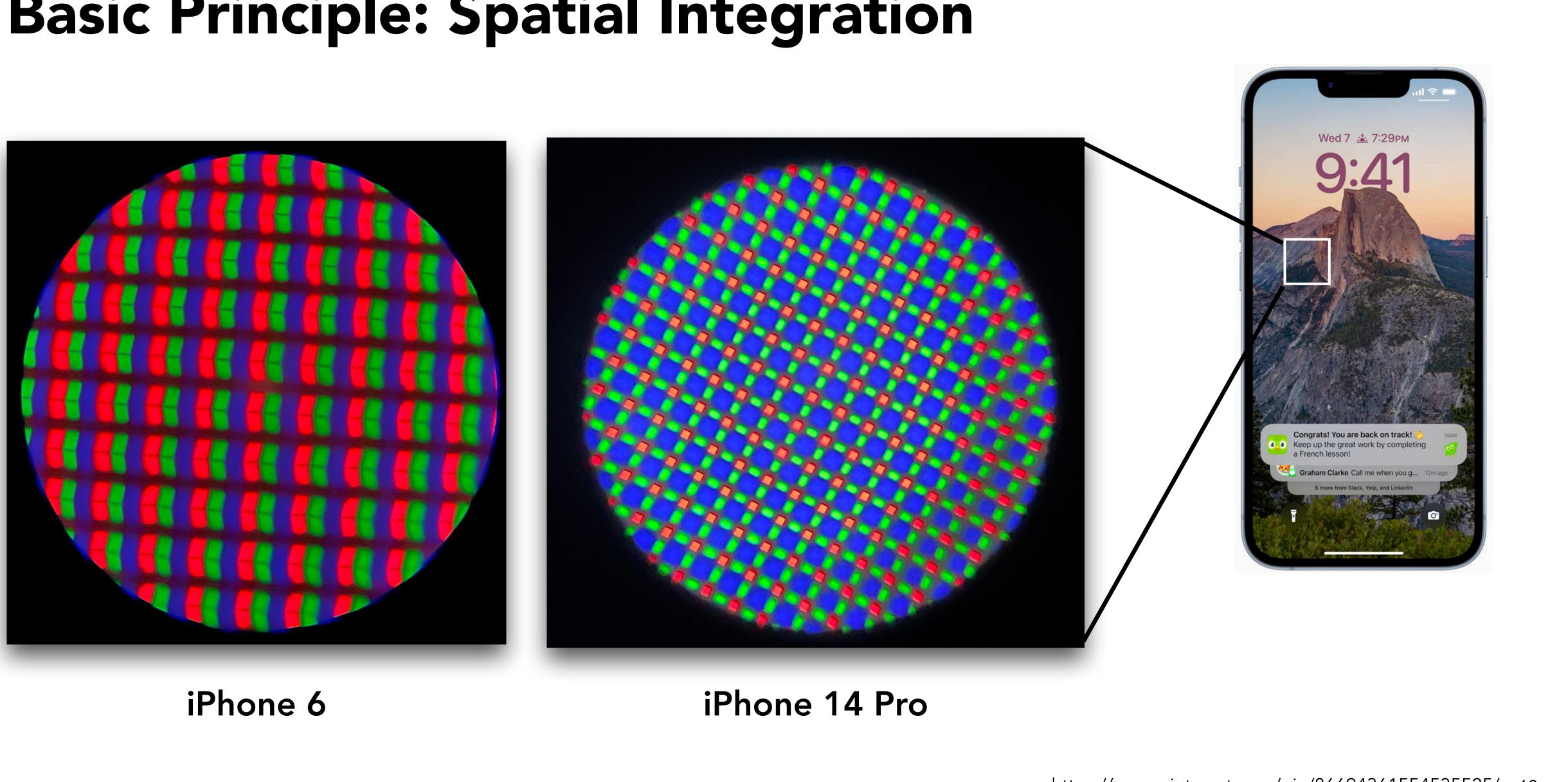
• Provided that the primaries are carefully chosen so that the target color falls within the gamut of the color space.

For displays, this means we don't need to produce the exact light **spectrum** if our goal is simply to produce the desired **color**.





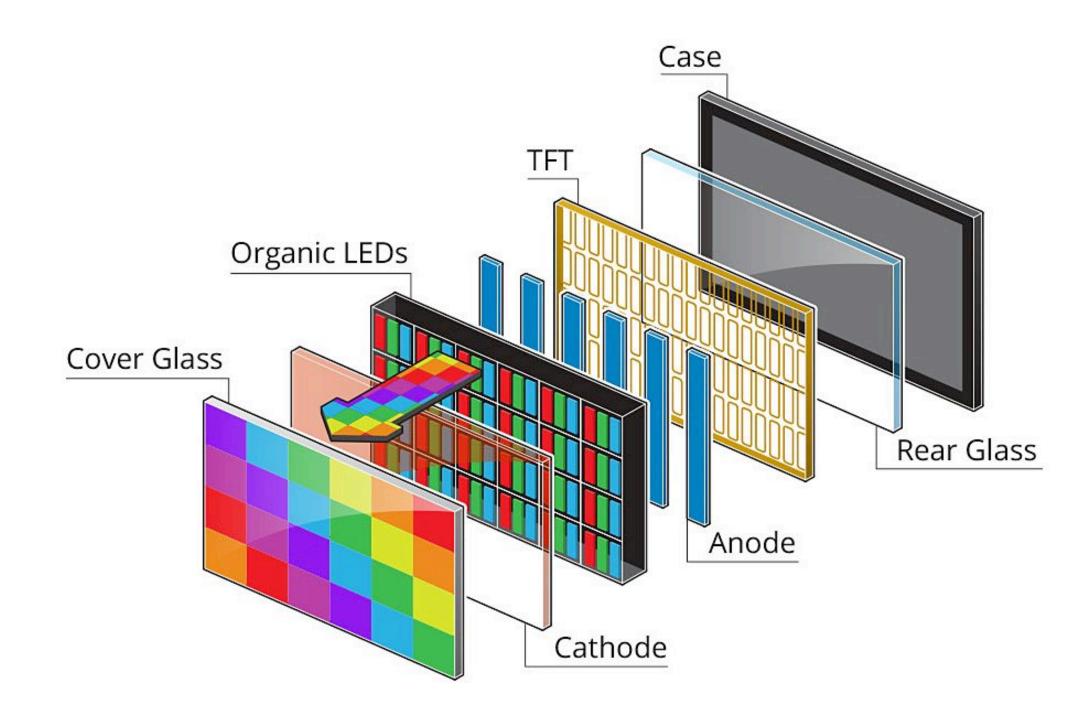

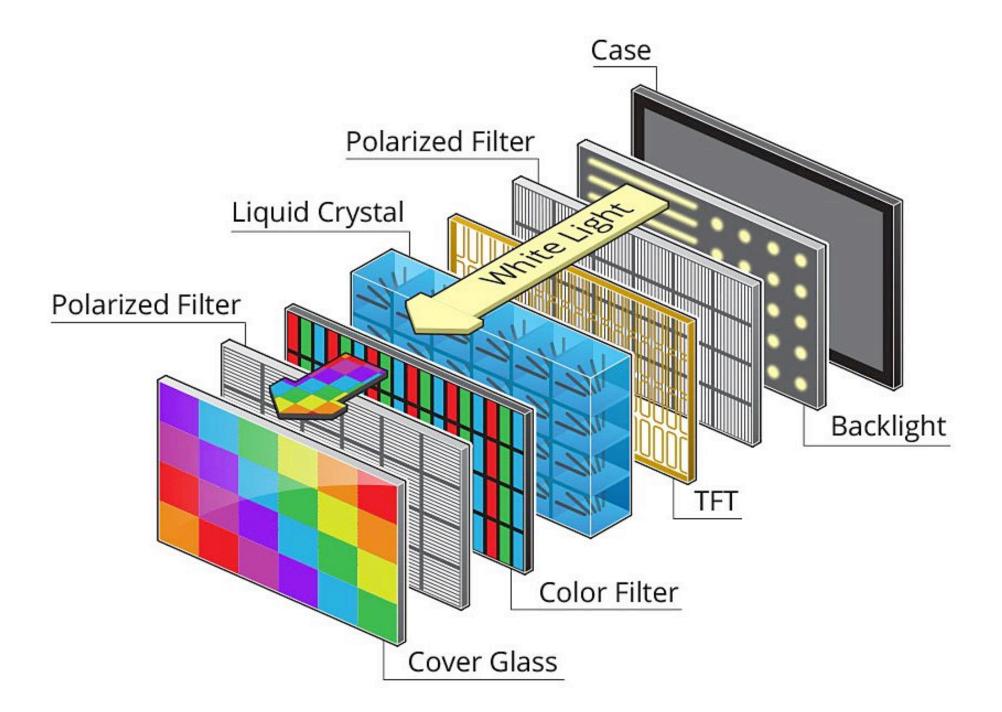

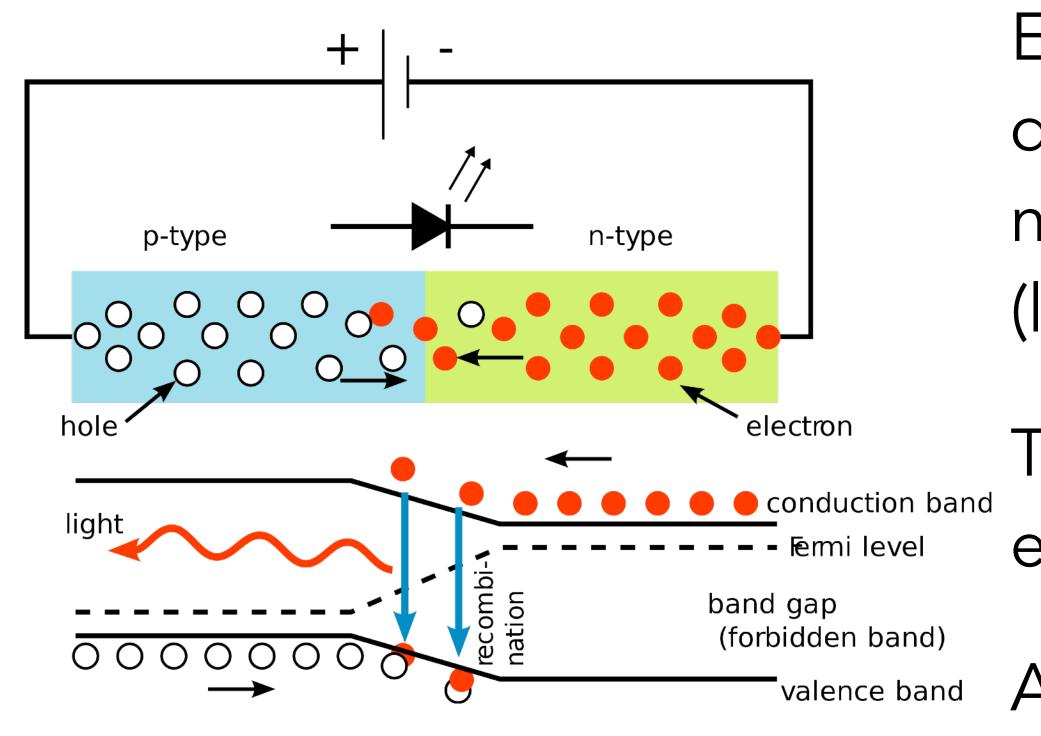

Light-Emitting Diodes: Photons From Electrons



External power creates potential differences that move electrons from the n-side (higher energy state) to the p-side (lower energy state), releasing photons.

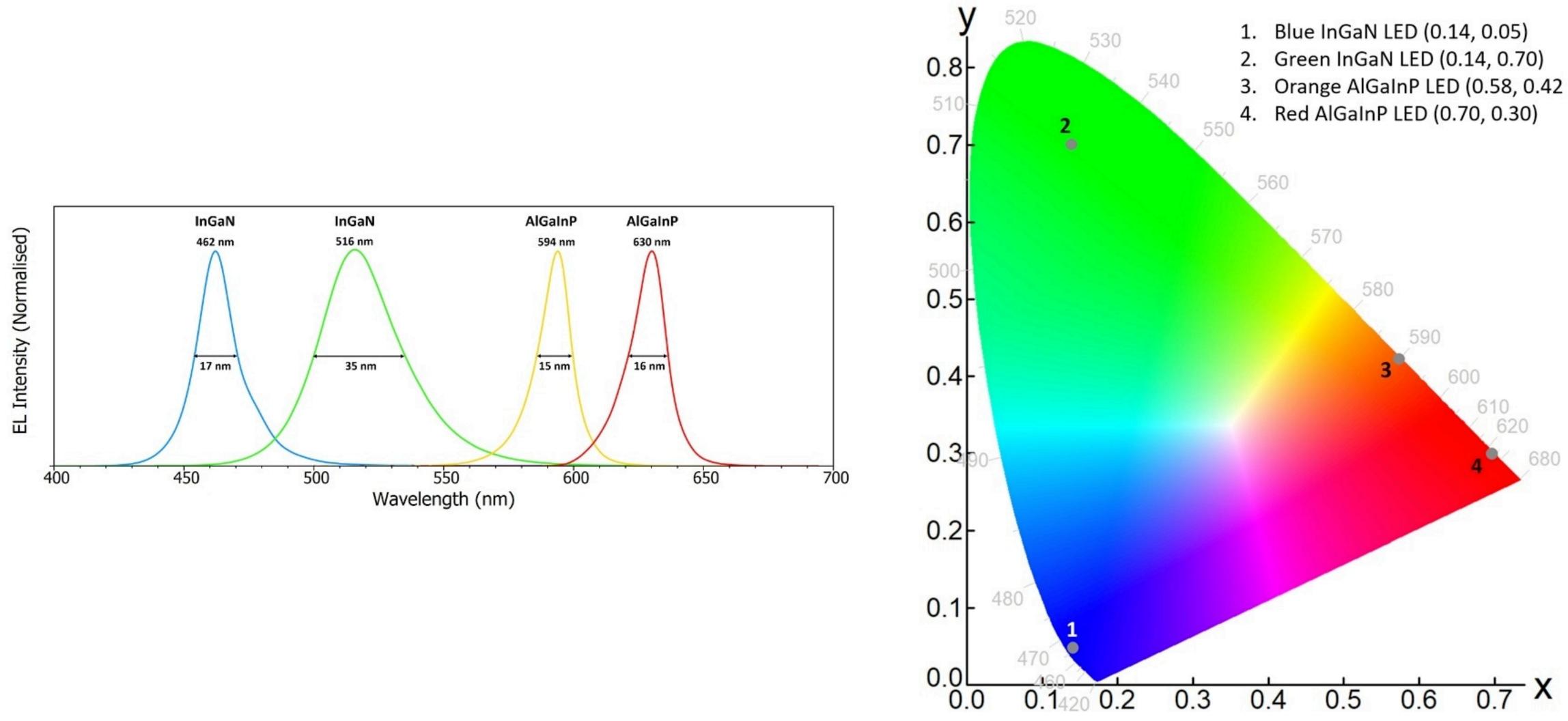
The photon wavelength depends on the energy gap, which depends on material.

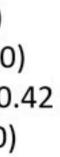
A form of electroluminescence.

- Variants: OLED, QLED, AMOLED, etc.
- Two common materials: AlGaInP and InGanN.

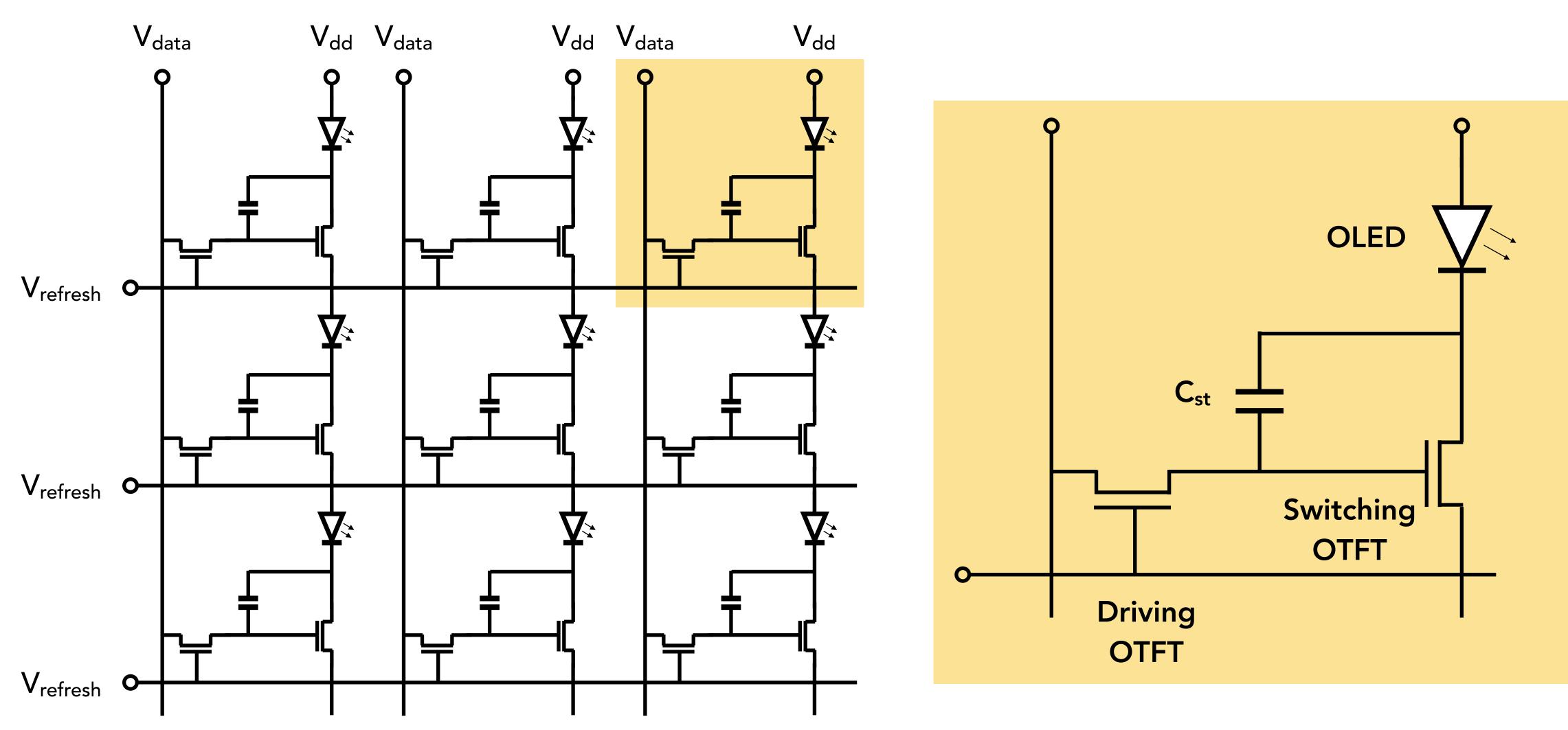








OLED Pixel Circuit



Textile Display with AMOLED Using a Stacked-Pixel Structure on a Polyethylene Terephthalate Fabric Substrate 20



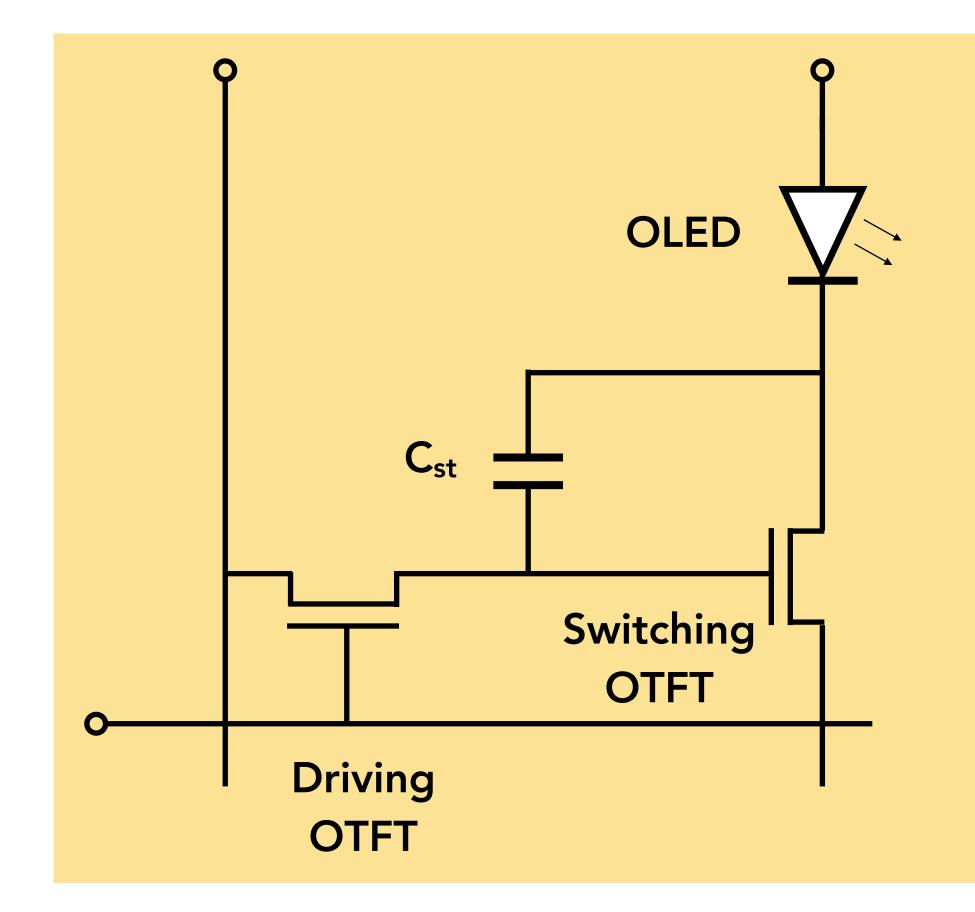
OLED Pixel Circuit

The array is organized much like a SRAM array.

Each row is refreshed separately.

The capacitor holds the charge before next refresh.

The two thin-film transistors (TFTs) control the charging of the capacitor and driving the OLED.

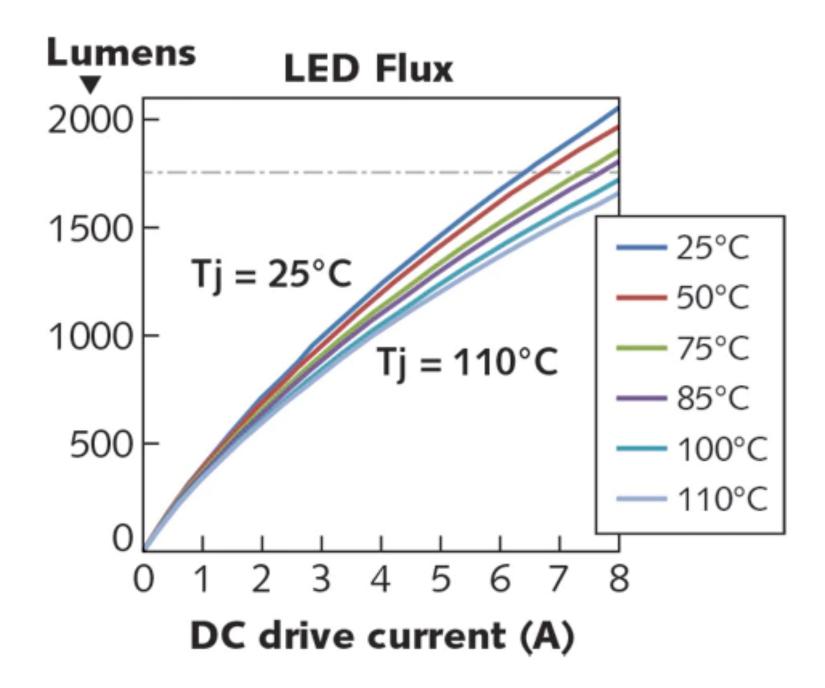


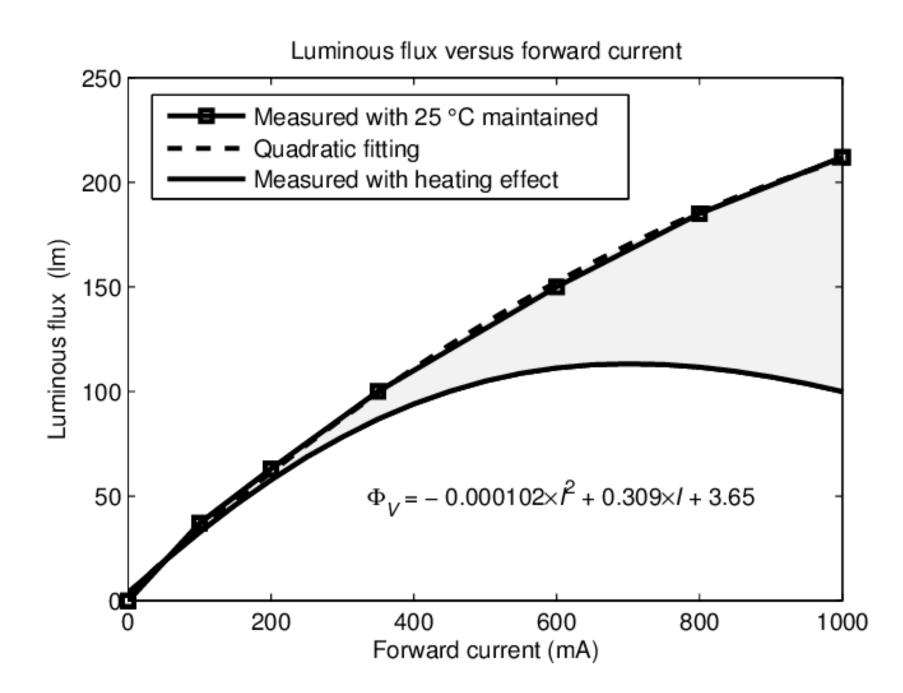

Controlling Intensity of LEDs

The **higher** is the **current** of the driver circuit and the **lower** is the temperature, the higher is the light output intensity (luminous flux).

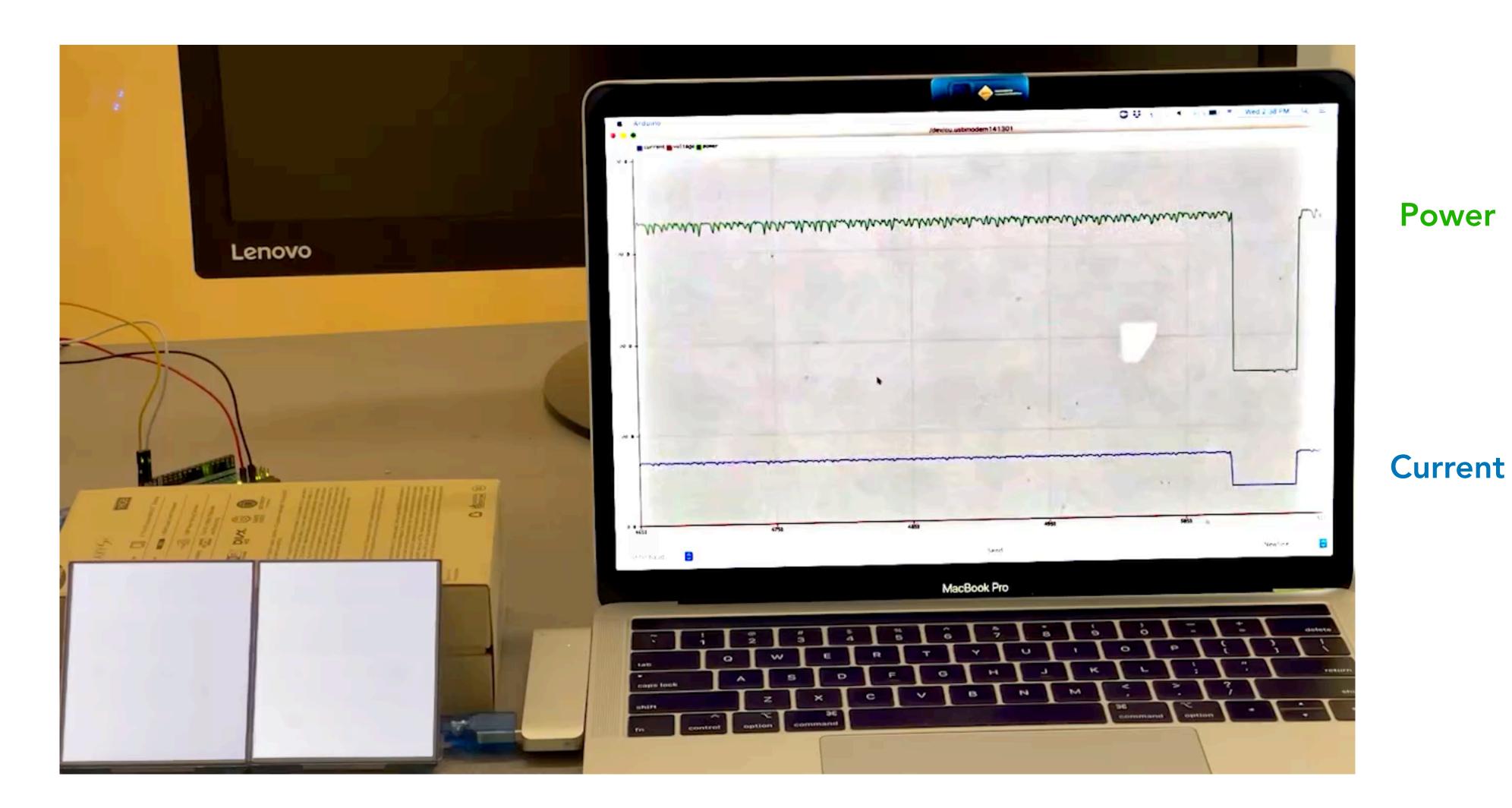

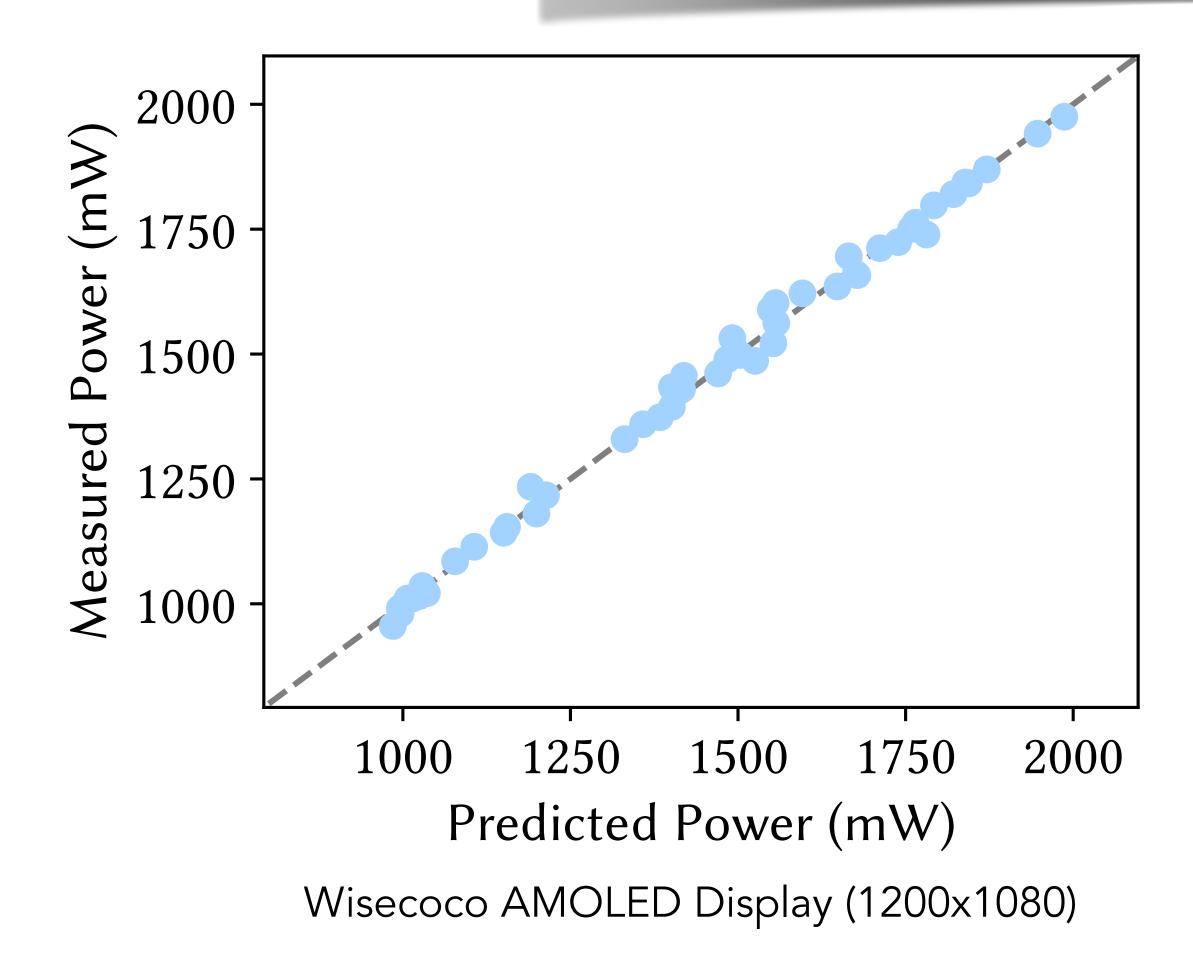

OLED Display Power vs. Color

Power = 233.5 * **R** + 209.6 * **G** + 567.7 * **B** + 983.8 (unit is mW)



Setup:

- All pixels display the same color.
- R, G, B are linear sRGB values (without gamma) and in the [0, 1] range.

The intercept (983.8) represents the circuit power independent of color.



Producing White in Emissive Display

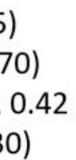
Mixing different colored LEDs.

Trade-off:

- More primaries means more stable white (one primary being off a little doesn't affect the "whiteness" much.
- More primaries means more LEDs (form factor). The luminance efficacy (lumen/watt) might be lower depending on what LEDs are used.

LEDs age at different rates; adjustment.

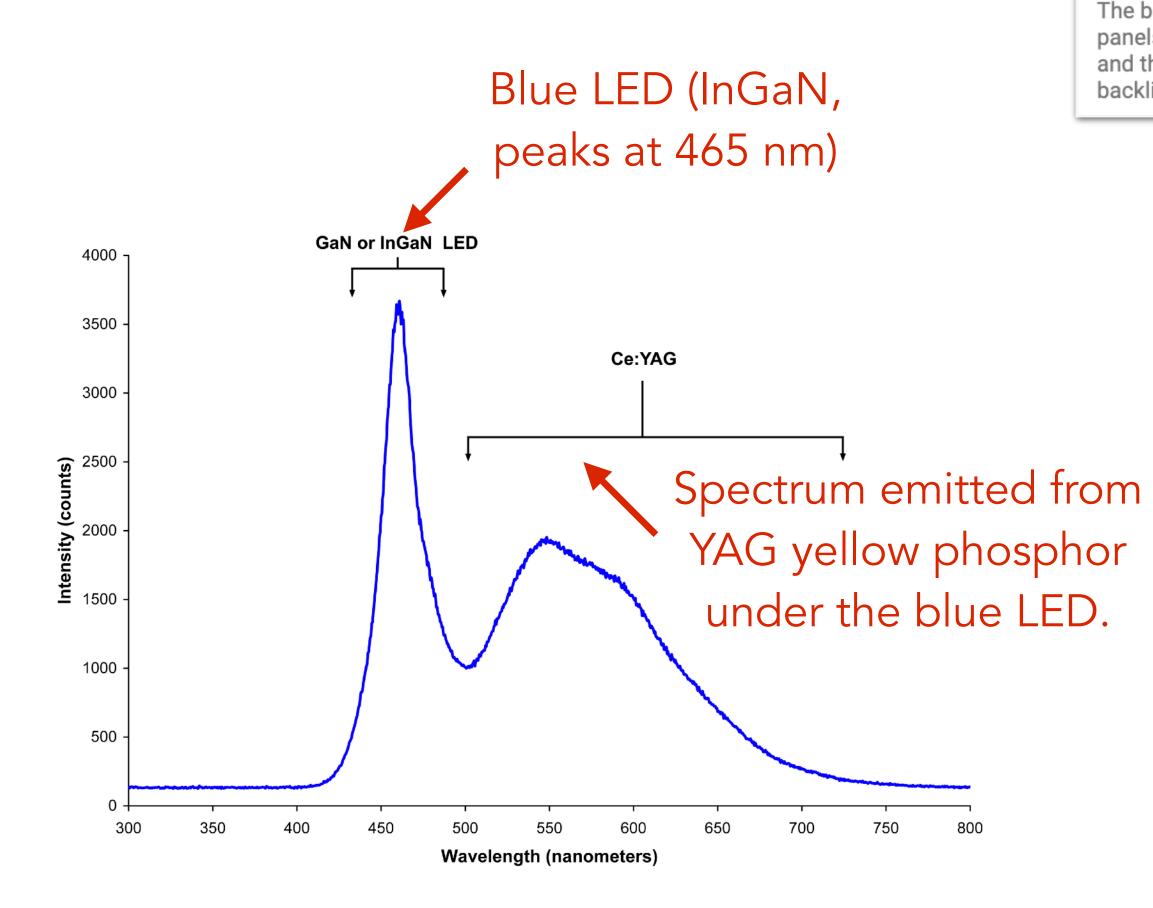








White LED



Backlight	
The backlight is the source of light of the LCD display panels. The type of backlight determines the image quality and the color space of the display. There are various backlights such as CCFL, LED, WLED, RGB-LED, and etc.	W-LED

From my LG LCD monitor

Use a blue LED to light fluorescent materials, which generate (usually) yellow spectrum.

 Also called "phosphor-converted white LED".

RGBW Sub-Pixel Structure

Some displays use the RBGW sub-pixel structure, which adds white sub-pixels.

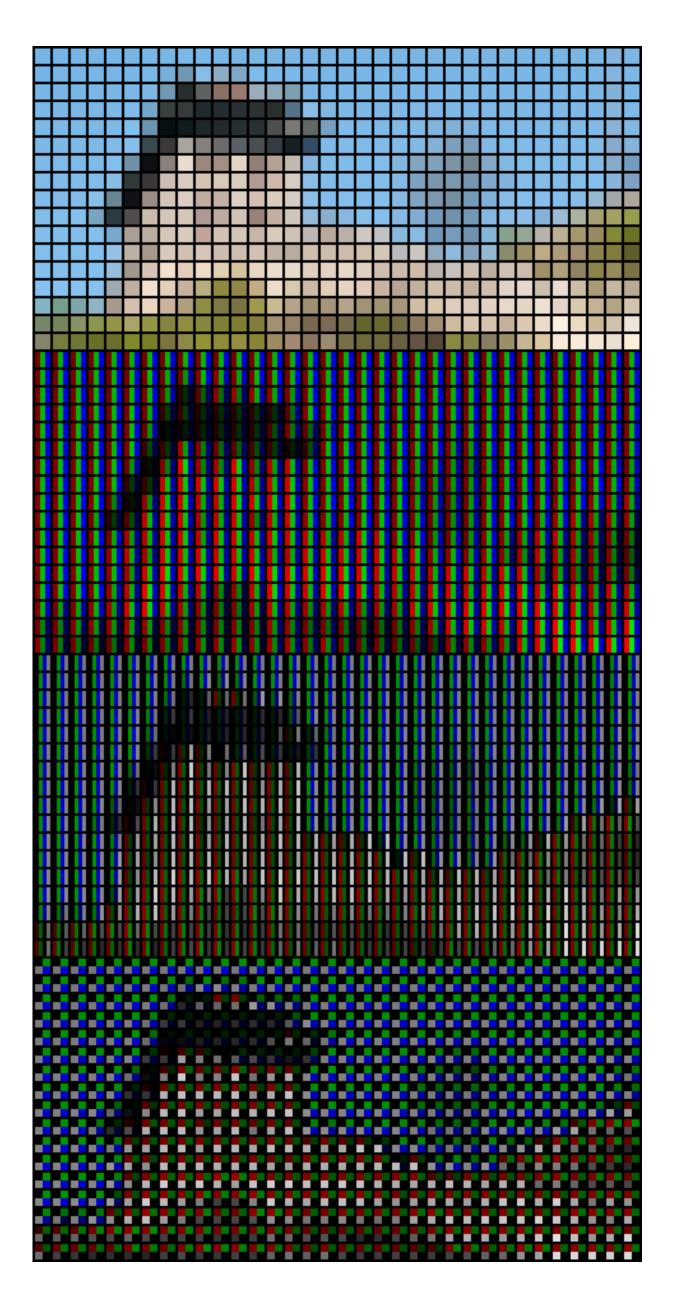
Why?

- Use W in place of R+G+B to improve power efficiency
- Add W to boost brightness (think of it as adding power to each of the RGB sub pixels). Sacrifice color fidelity; common in projectors.

Light-Filtering Display

White light source is **filtered** and attenuated at each pixel to control color and light intensity.

Used in Liquid Crystal Displays (LCD) and DLP projectors.





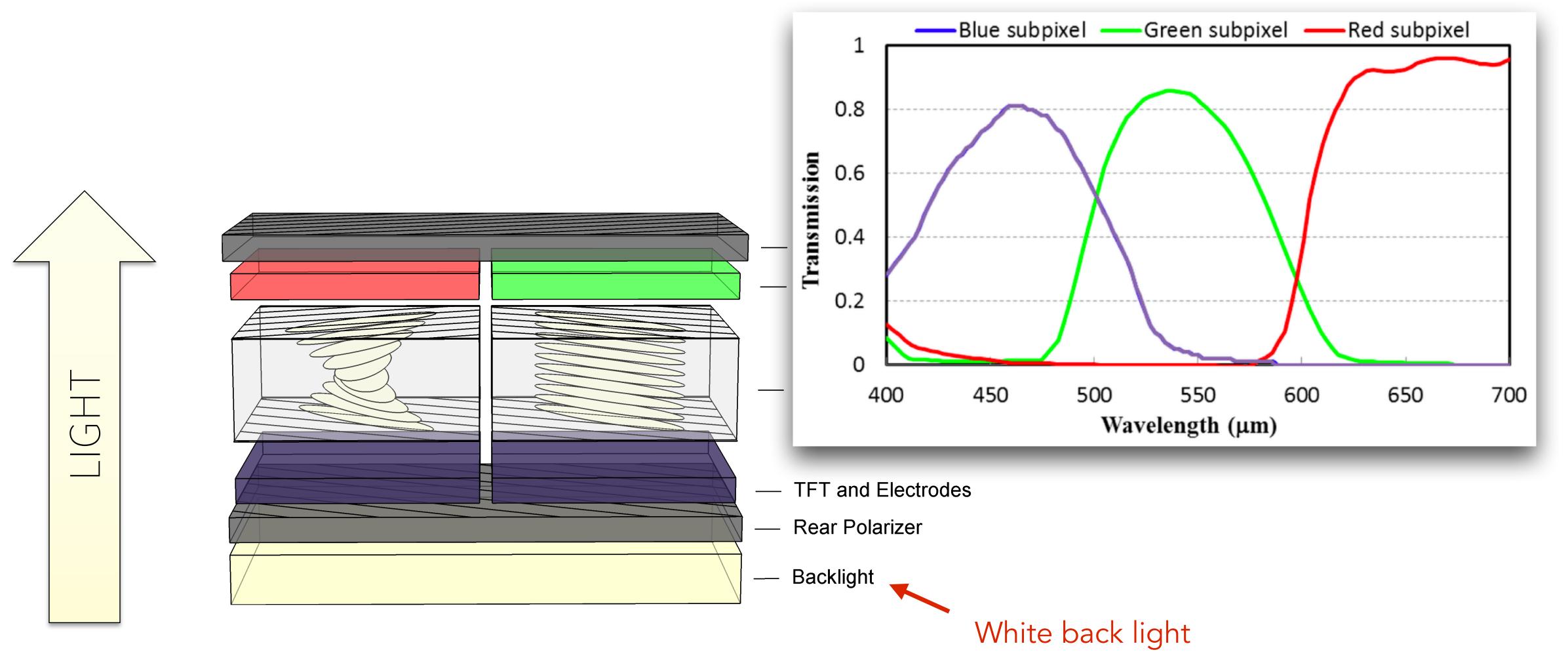

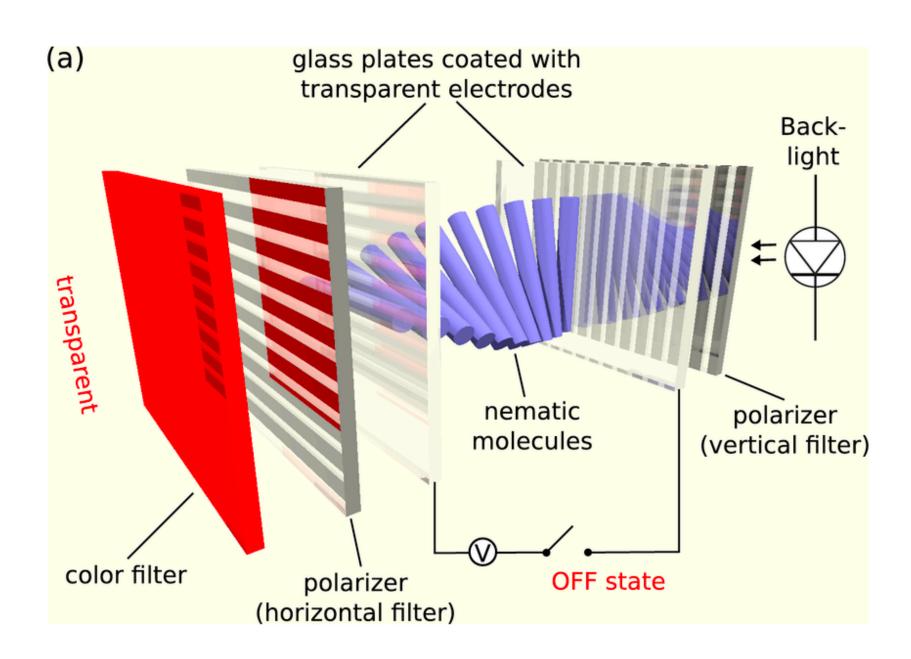

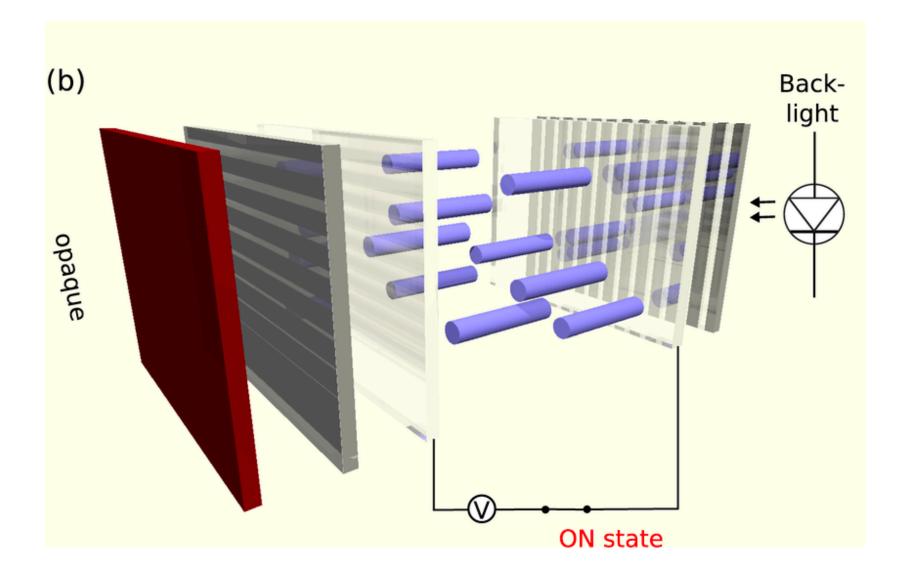


Controlling Intensity of LCD Pixels

In natural state, the liquid crystal rotates light by 90° so that light passes through the output polarizer.



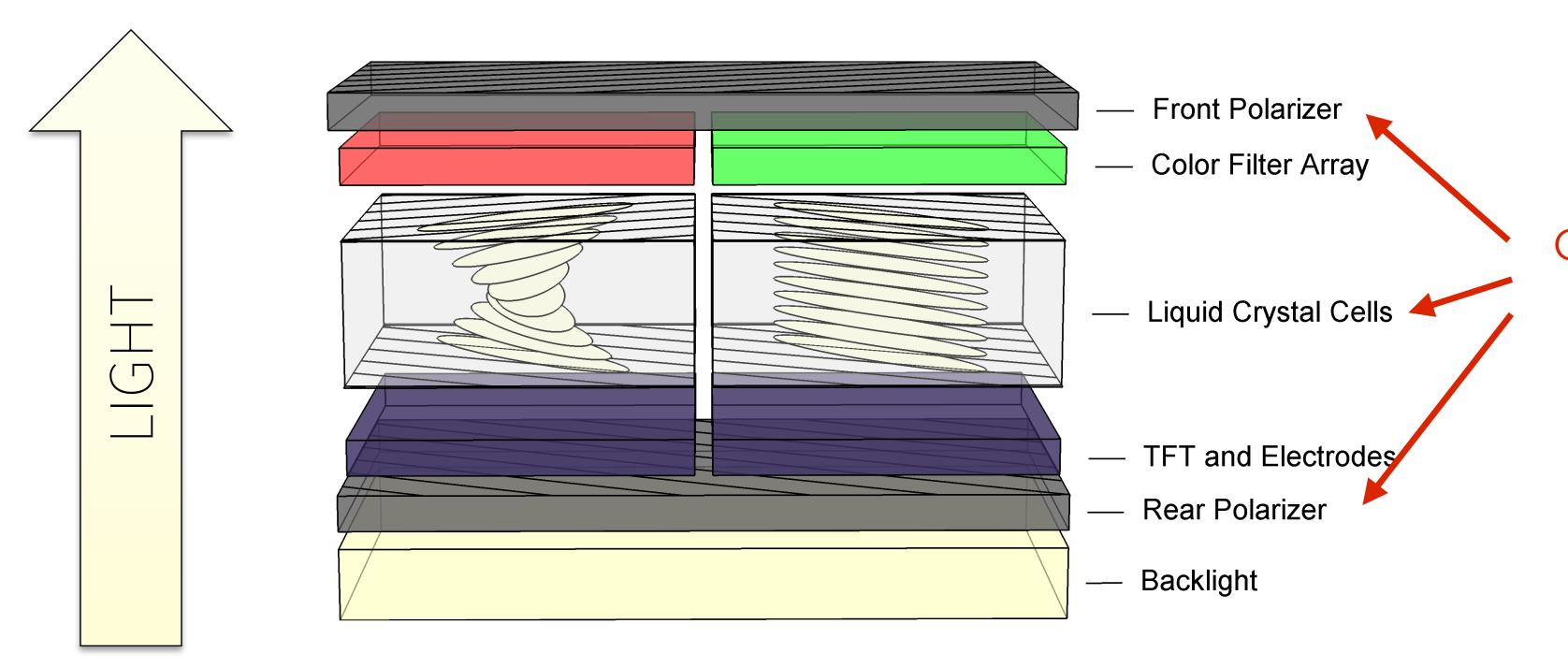
When applied electric field, the liquid crystal causes no change to light, which is blocked by the output polarizer.







Controlling Intensity of LCD Pixels



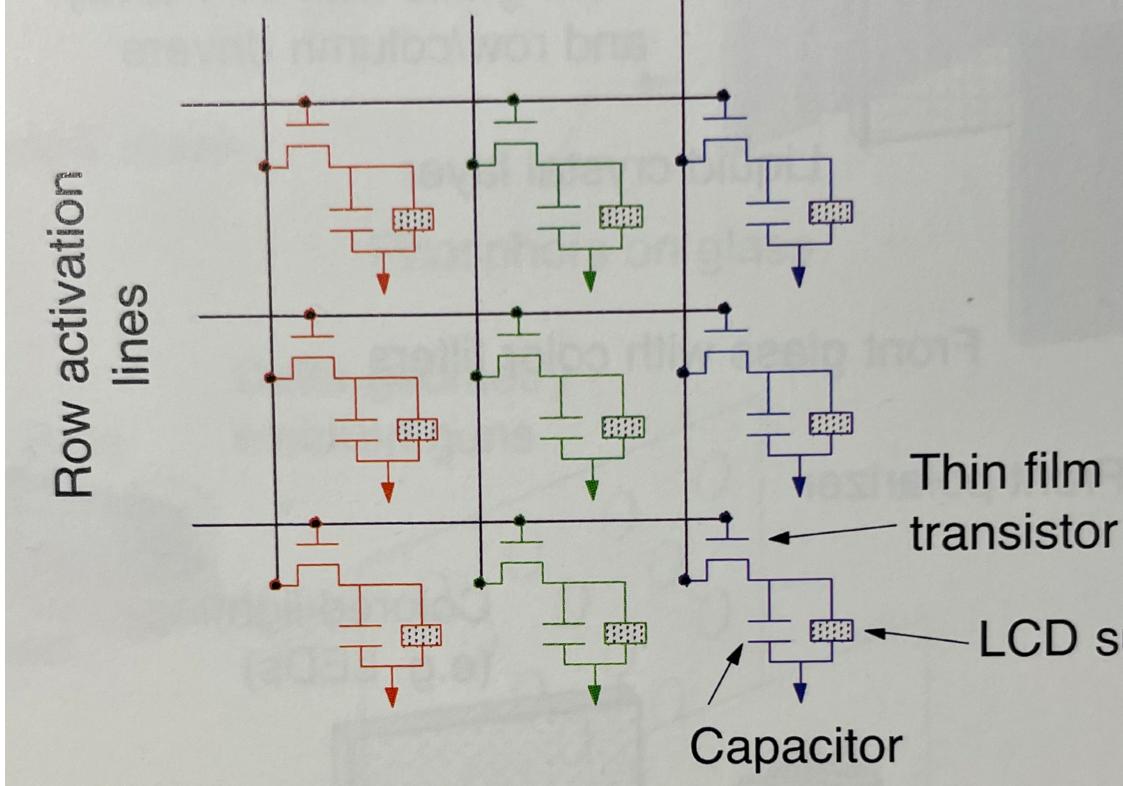
Collectively control how much light is allowed through.

LCD Pixel Array Circuit



CD subpixel

Array-like structure, similar to OLED/SRAM. Each row is refreshed separately.

The thin film transistor acts as an access switch. The capacitor holds the charge before next refresh.



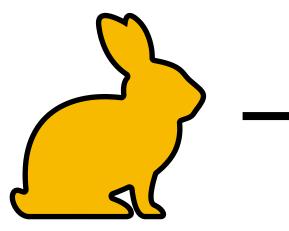

Refresh Rate and Motion Blur

Caused by the "sample and hold" nature of displays. Your eyes tend to

The end result is the object smears across your retina — motion blur.

Fixes: reduce the size of the smear

- Increase the refresh rate (cons: power increase)
- Use "low-persistence" mode: for each refresh cycle display the image only for a short period of time with a black screen for the remaining time before next frame arrives (cons: lower brightness)

Variable-refresh-rate displays have been investigated.

- perform smooth pursuit but object appears on display in discrete locations.



Sequential Color Displays



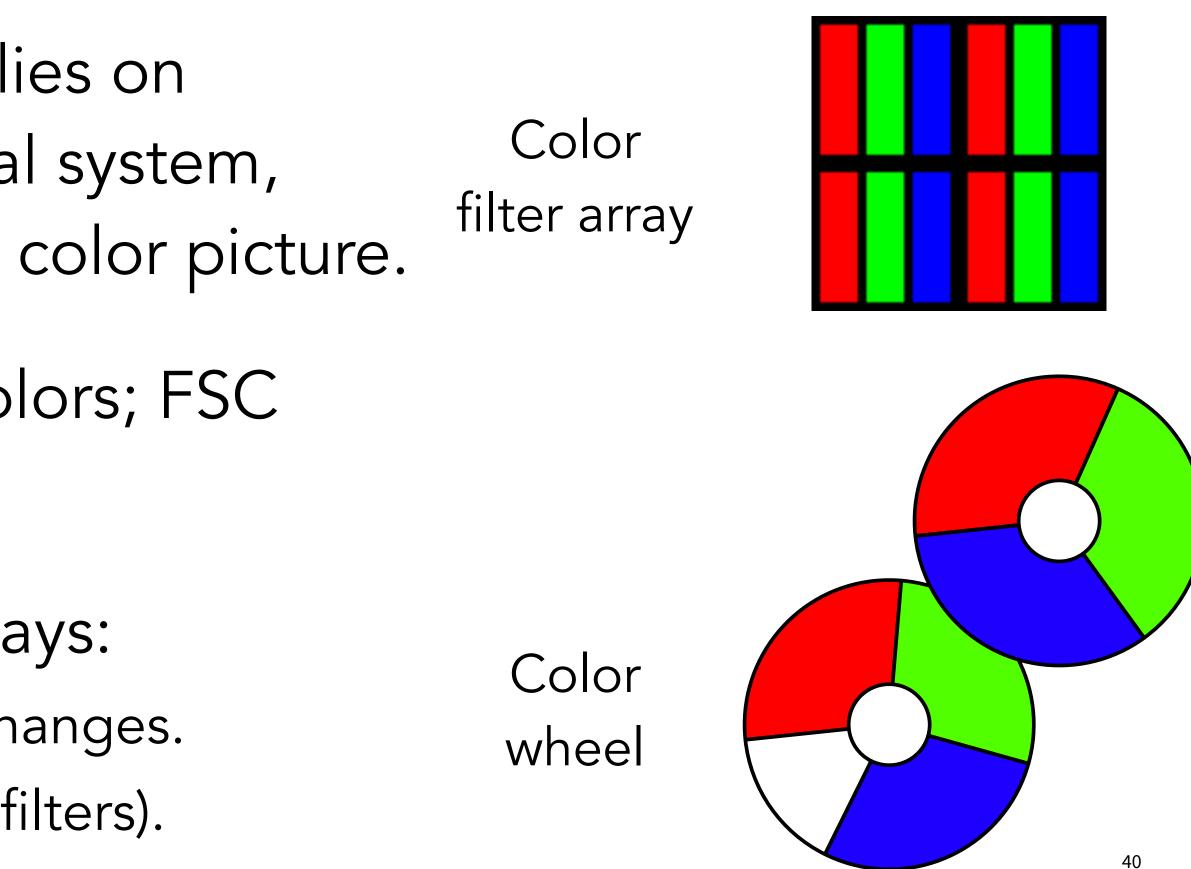
Field Sequential Color (FSC)

Flash each primary at a high rate. Relies on temporal integration in human visual system, which fuses successive images into a color picture.

Color filtering array **spatially** adds colors; FSC temporally adds color.

Compared to using color filtering arrays:

- + 3X higher resolution if nothing else changes.
- + higher luminous efficacy (if not using filters).
- + manufacturing cost is lower.

CBS FSC TV System

CBS debuted the FSC TV system in 1940.

• Obsolete now. Watch a <u>video</u> demo.

24 rotations per second. Each color is scanned twice per rotation.

Transmitted images are black and white. Each image (also called a field) is unique and is insync with the color filter.

• Each B/W pixel encoded brightness.

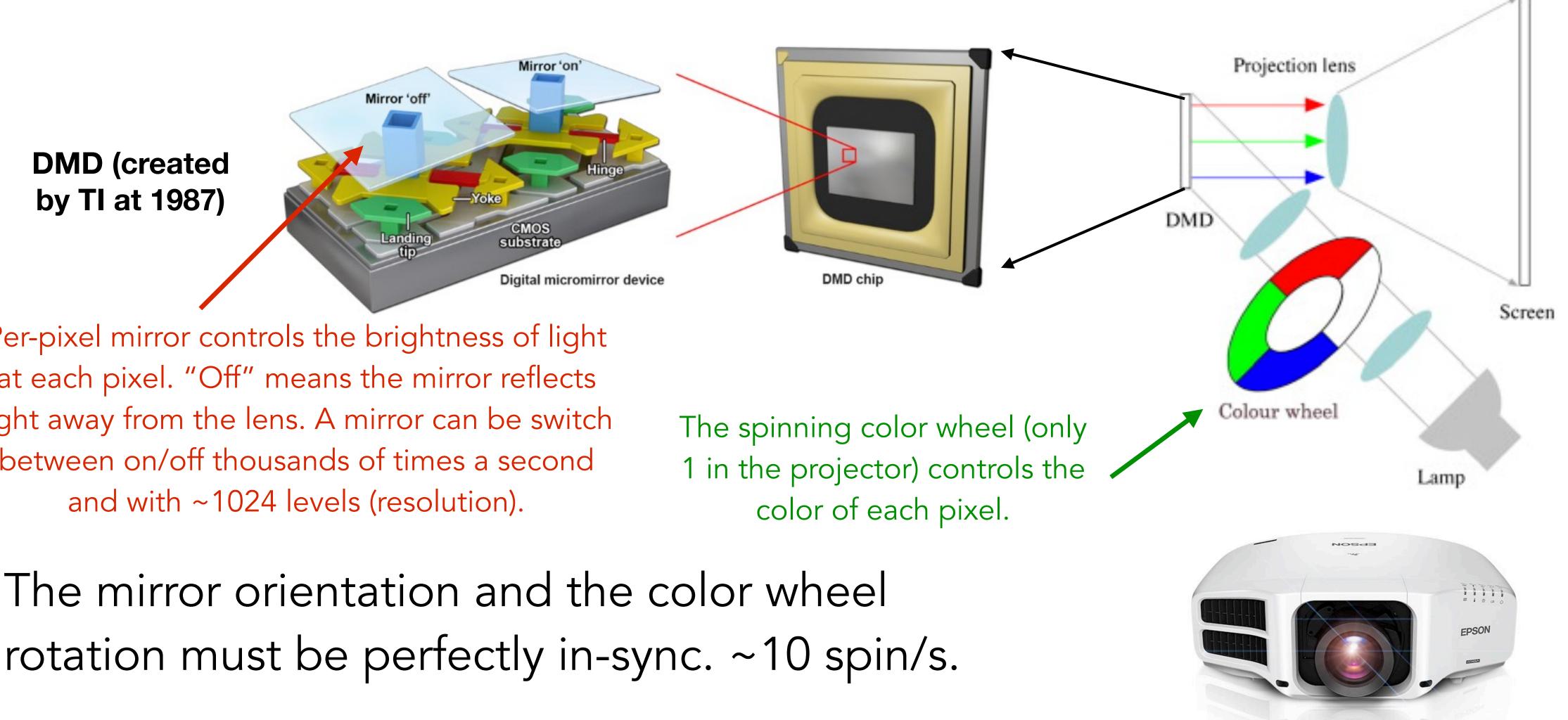
 $24 \times 6 = 144$ fields/s transmitted.







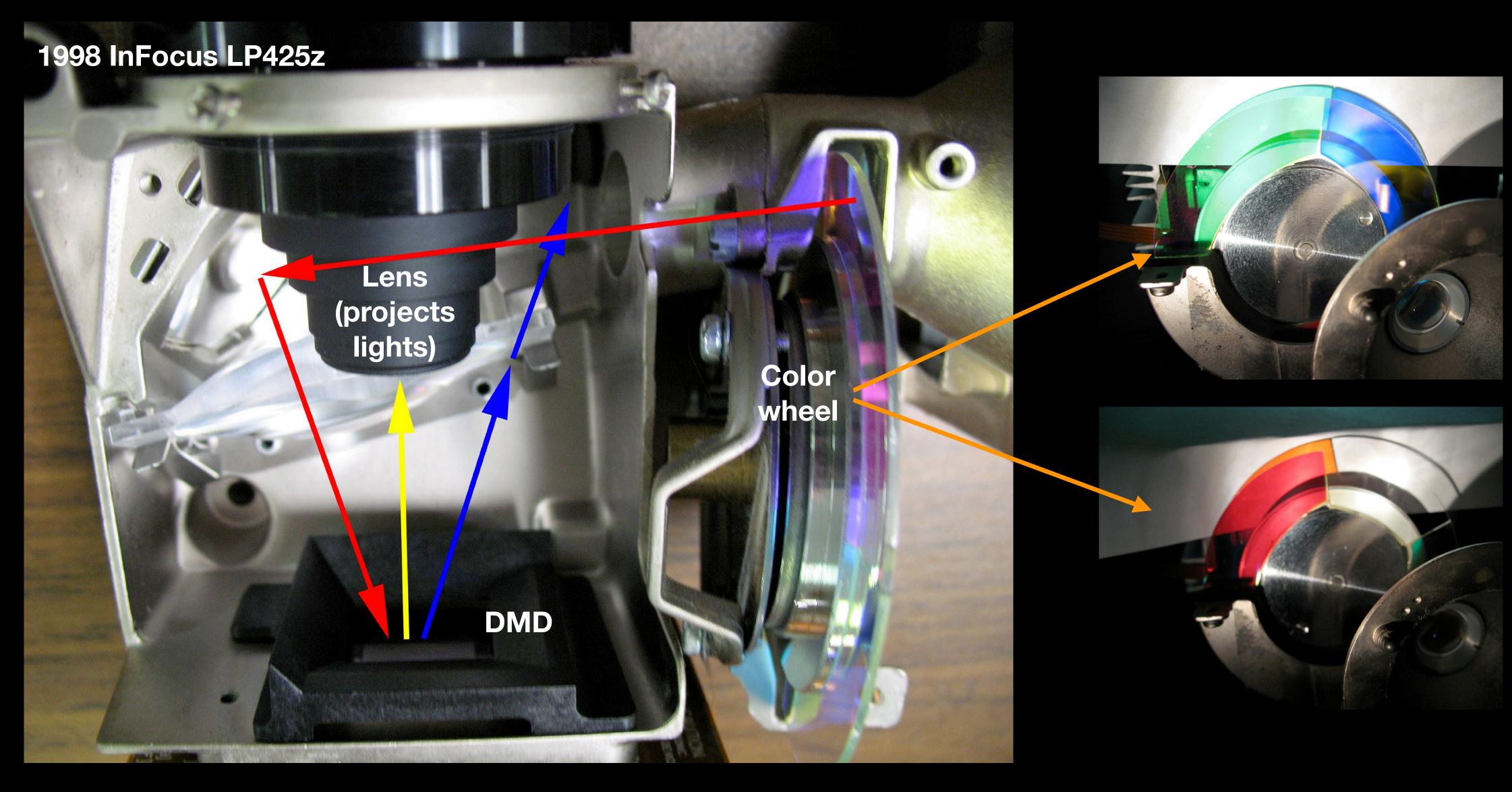
FSC in Digital Light Processing (DLP) Projectors



Per-pixel mirror controls the brightness of light at each pixel. "Off" means the mirror reflects light away from the lens. A mirror can be switch between on/off thousands of times a second

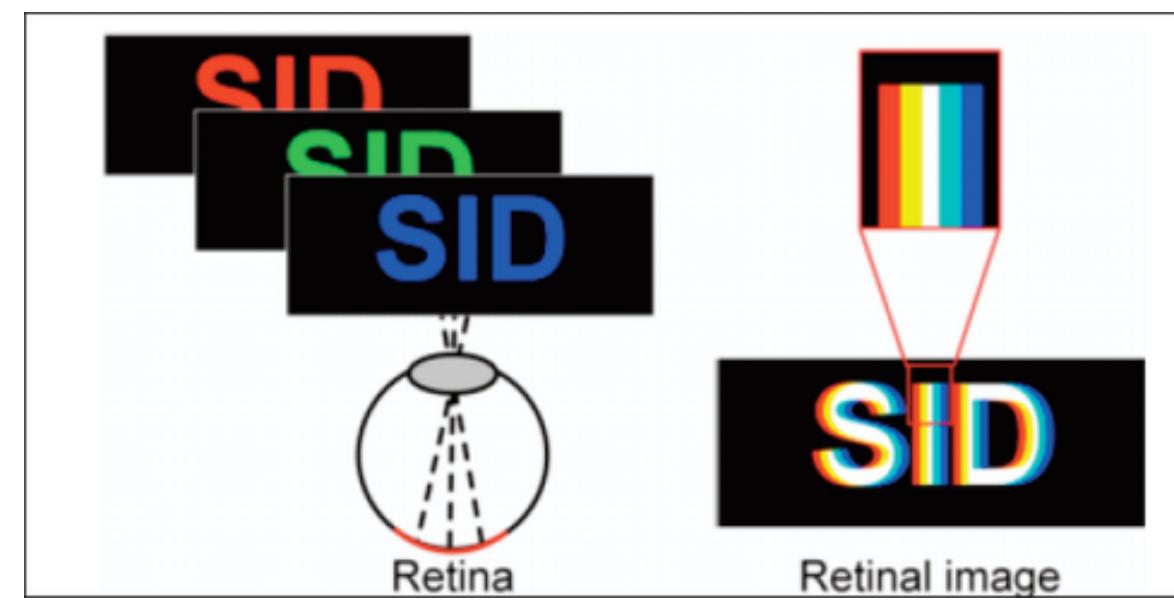

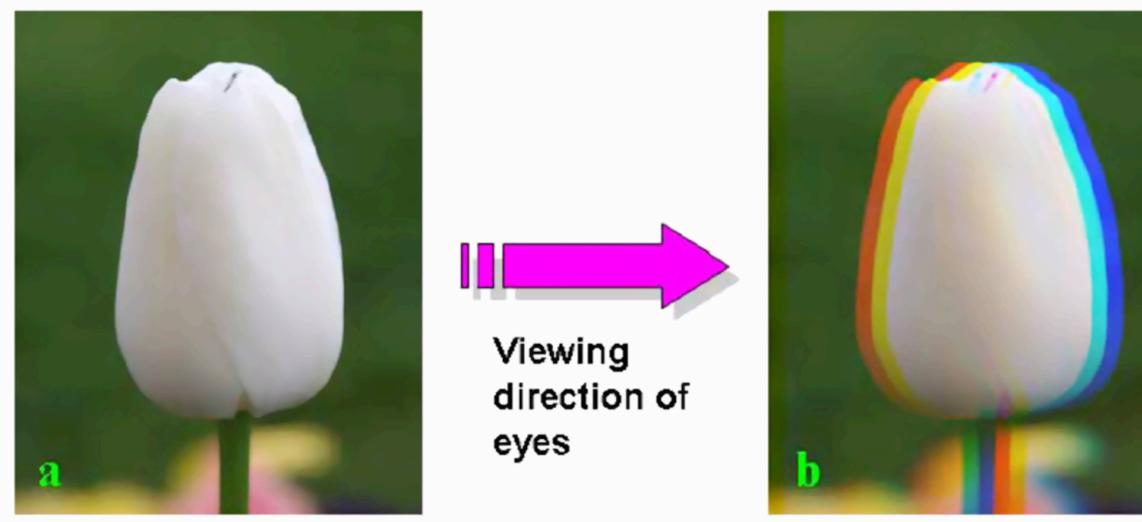
Color Breakup in FSC

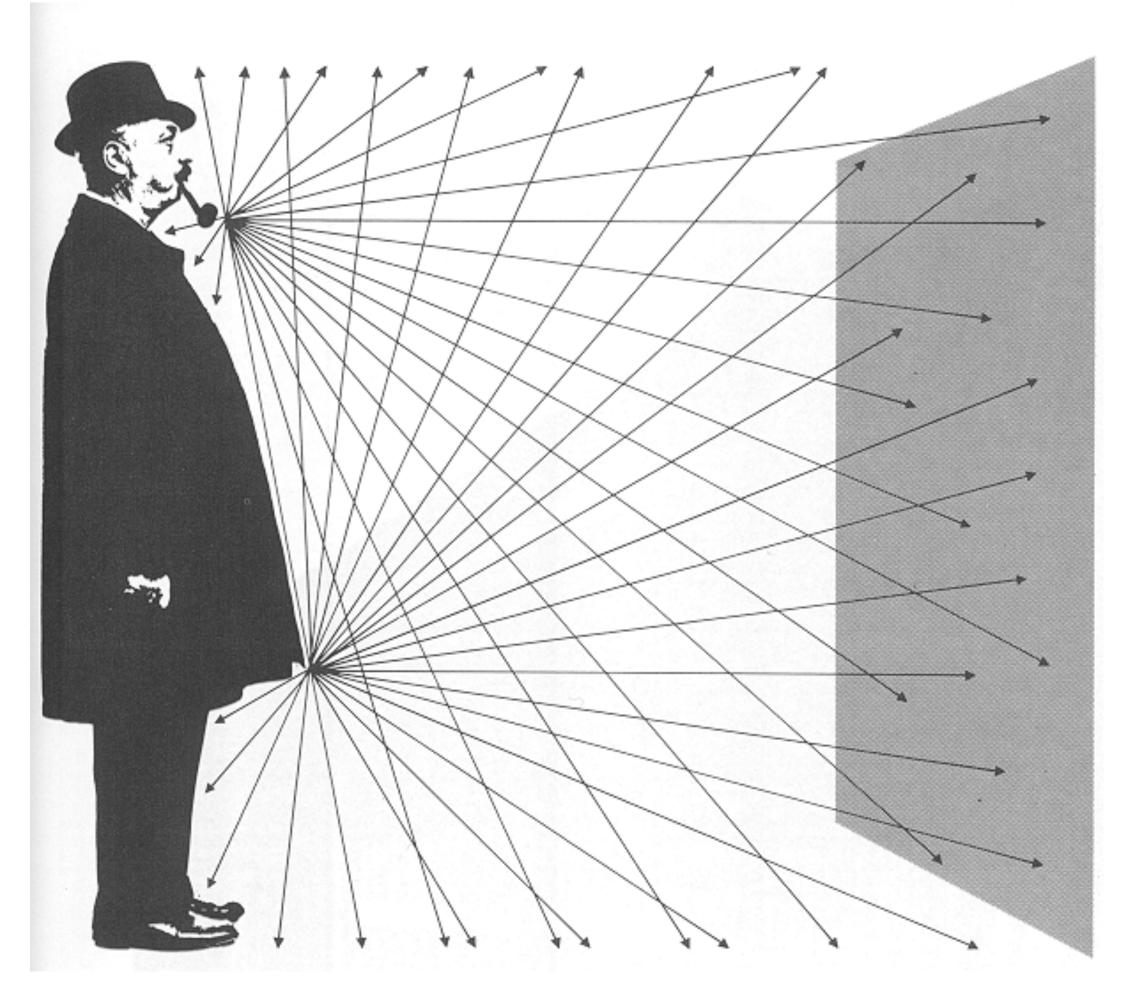

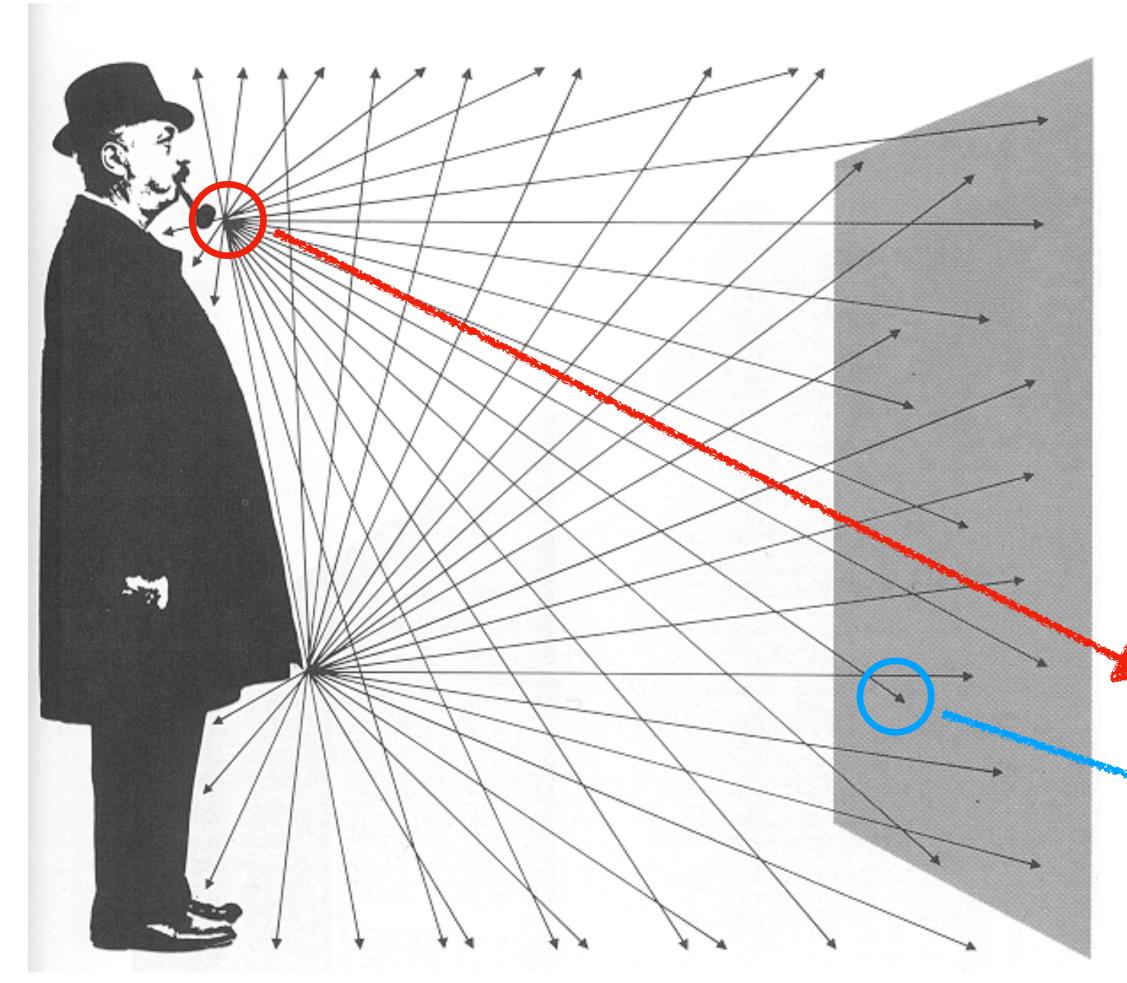

Irradiance vs. Radiance

Irradiance: power per unit area

Power vs. Luminous Flux

LEF: inversely proportional to the power needed at each wavelength to produce same level of neural response (brightness).

• The constant 683 is to normalize to historical standards.

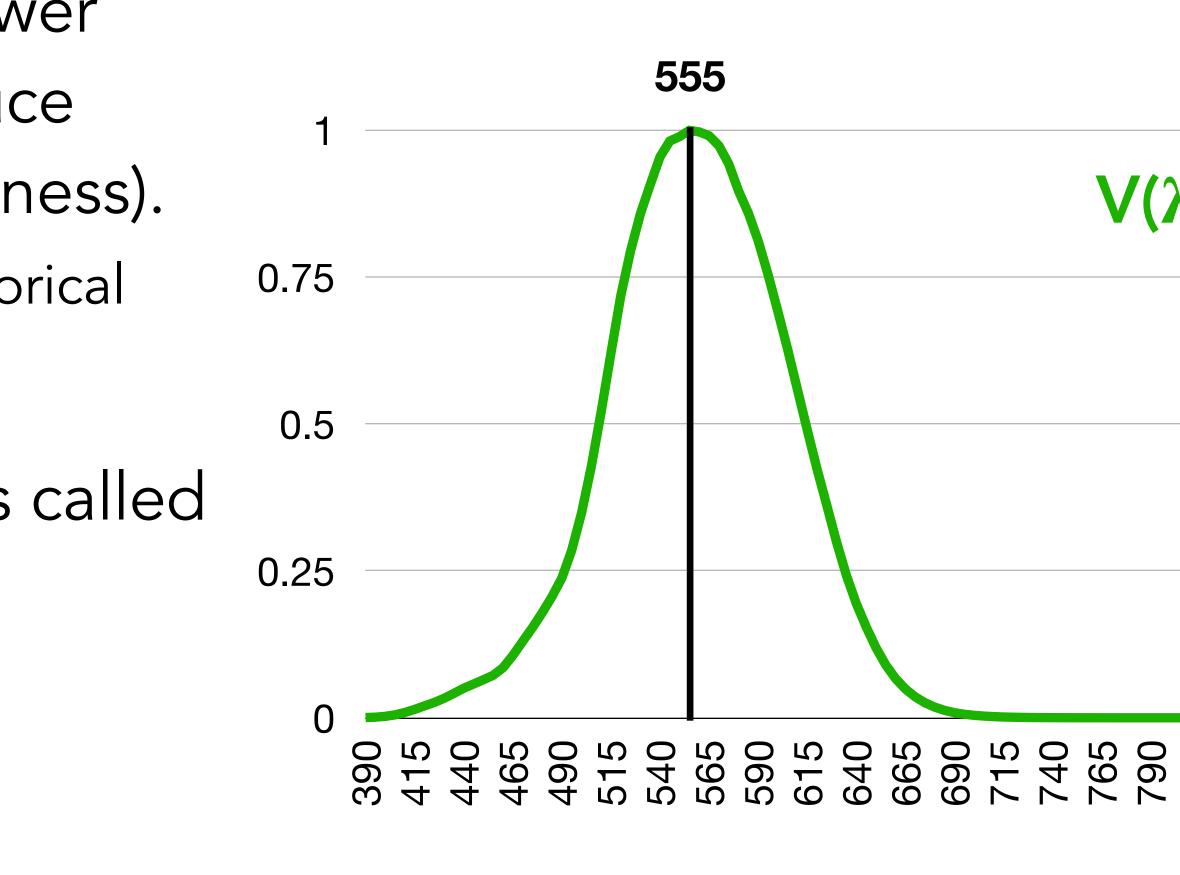
Power (unit: watt) weighted by LEF is called luminous flux (unit: **lumen**).

$$\Phi_{v}(\lambda) = 683 \frac{lm}{W} \Phi_{e}(\lambda) V(\lambda)$$

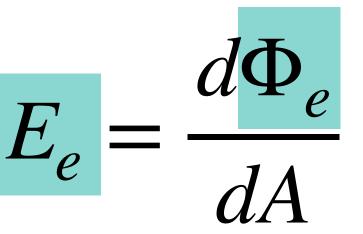




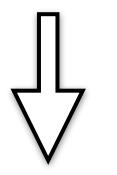

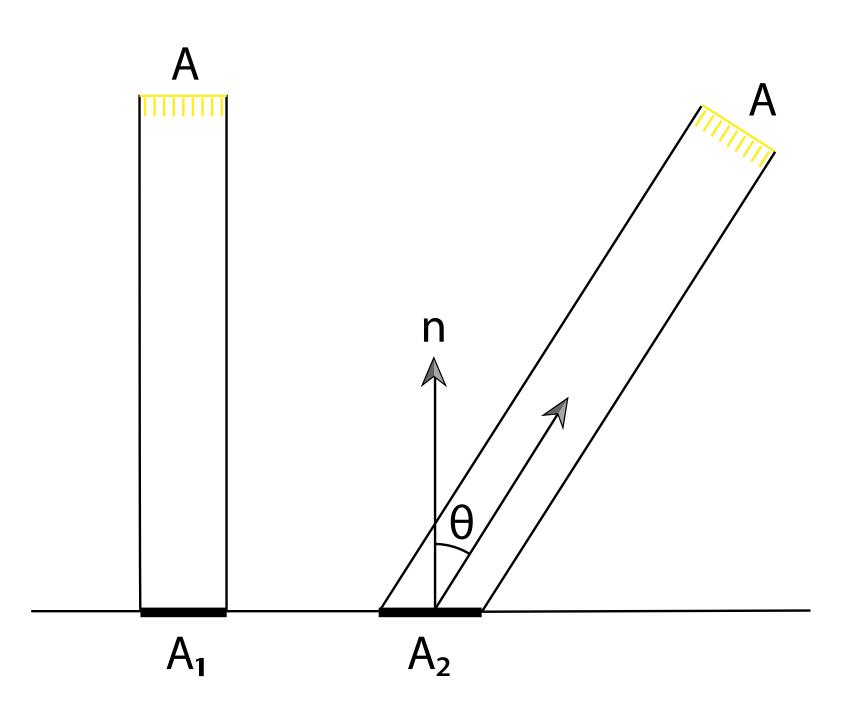

Irradiance Falls Off With Incident Angle



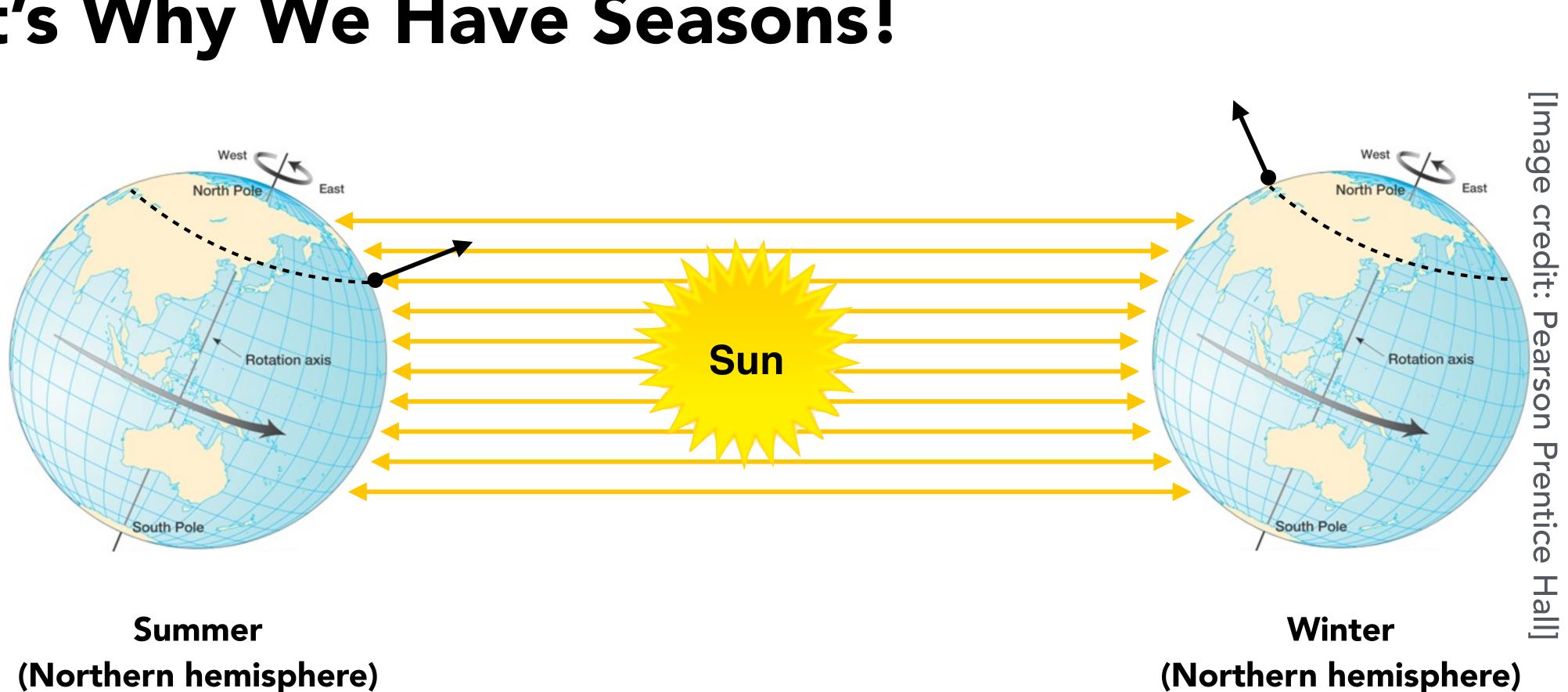
Intuition is that the incident photons get smeared across a larger area as incident angle increases. Extreme case: incident light is parallel to the surface, in which case the surface irradiance is 0.

$$E_{e,1} = \frac{d\Phi_e}{dA_1}$$

$$E_{e,2} = \frac{d\Phi_e}{dA_2} = \frac{d\Phi_e \cos\theta}{dA_2}$$



That's Why We Have Seasons!



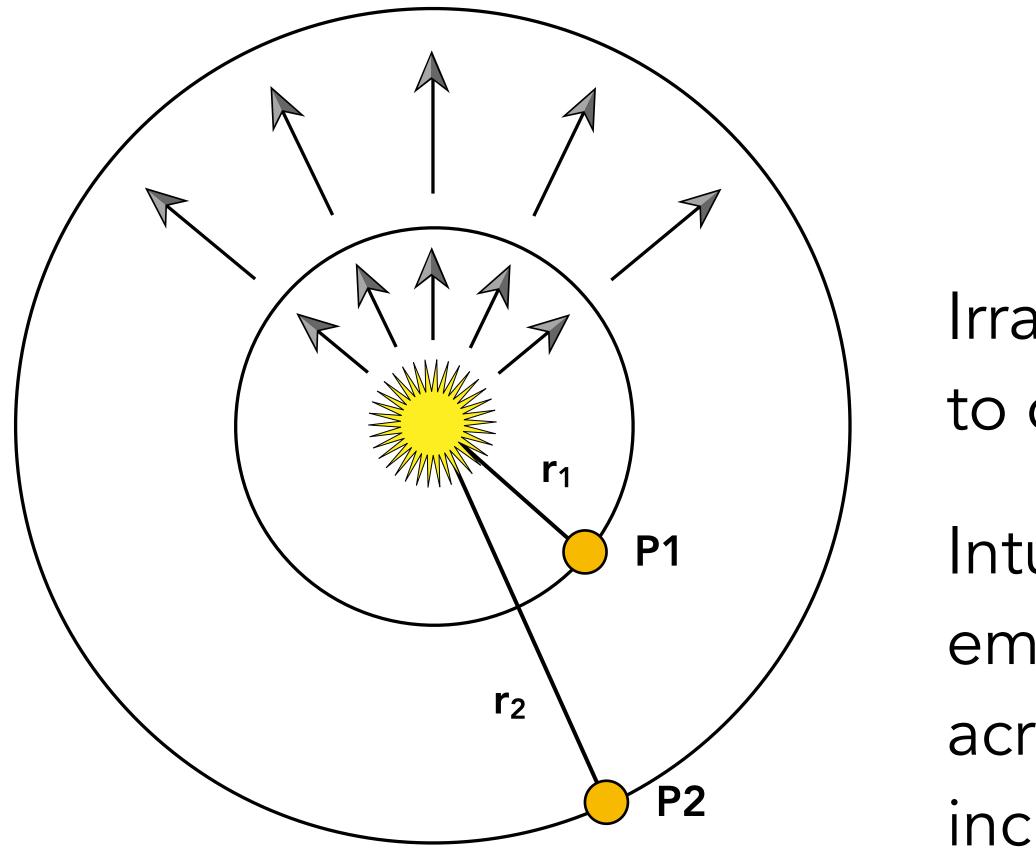
(Northern hemisphere)

Earth's axis of rotation: ~23.5° off axis





Irradiance Falls Off With Distance



$$E_{e,1} = \frac{\Phi_e}{4\pi r_1^2} \qquad E_{e,2} = \frac{\Phi_e}{4\pi r_2^2}$$

Irradiance falls off quadratically with respect to distance.

Intuition: the same amount of photons emitted from the light source gets smeared across a larger surface area as distance increases.



How to Describe Direction? Angles and Solid Angles

Angle: ratio of subtended arc length on circle to radius

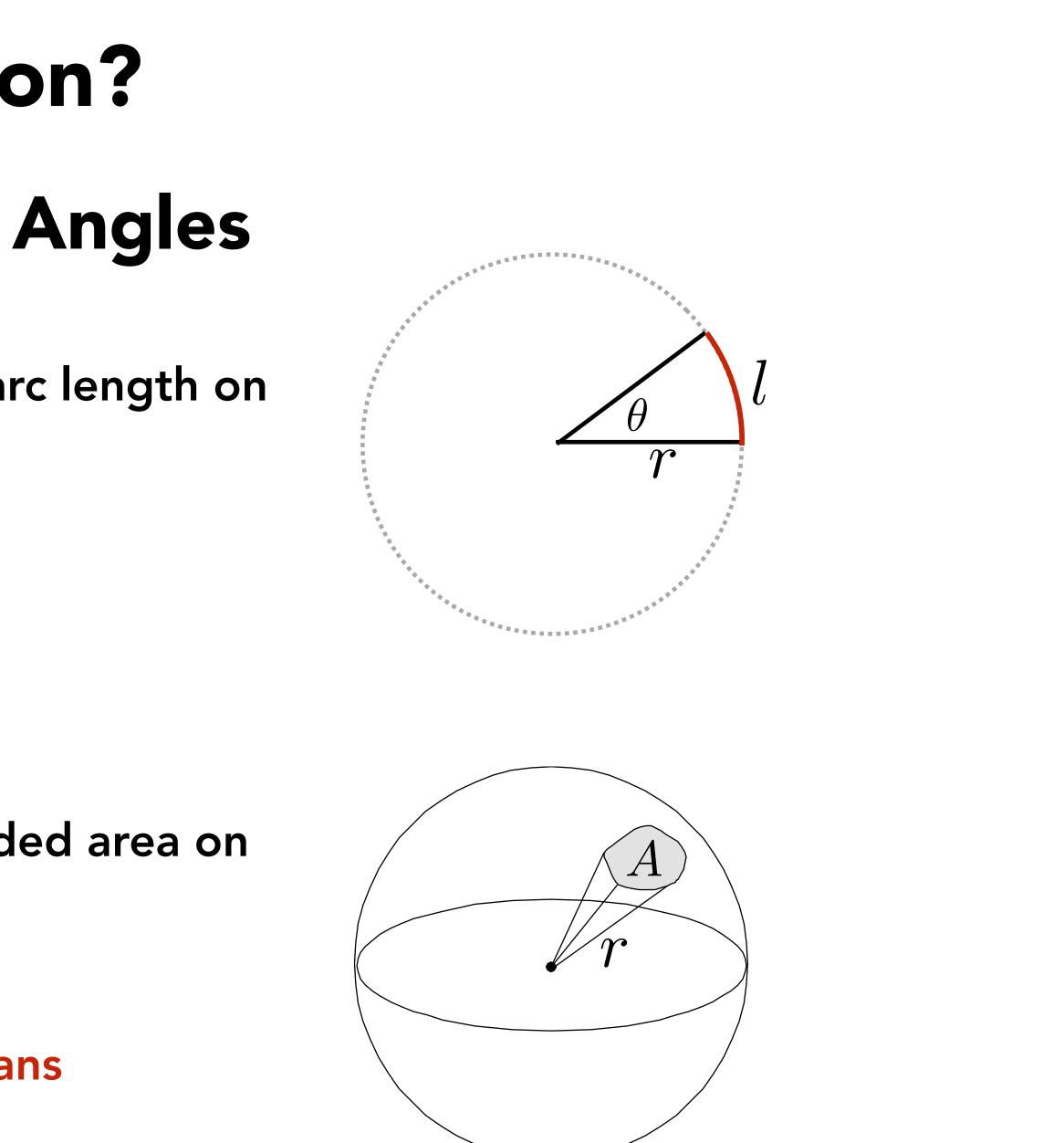
•
$$\theta = \frac{l}{r}$$

• Circle has 2π radians

Solid angle: ratio of subtended area on sphere to radius squared

•
$$\Omega = \frac{A}{r^2}$$

• Sphere has 4π steradians

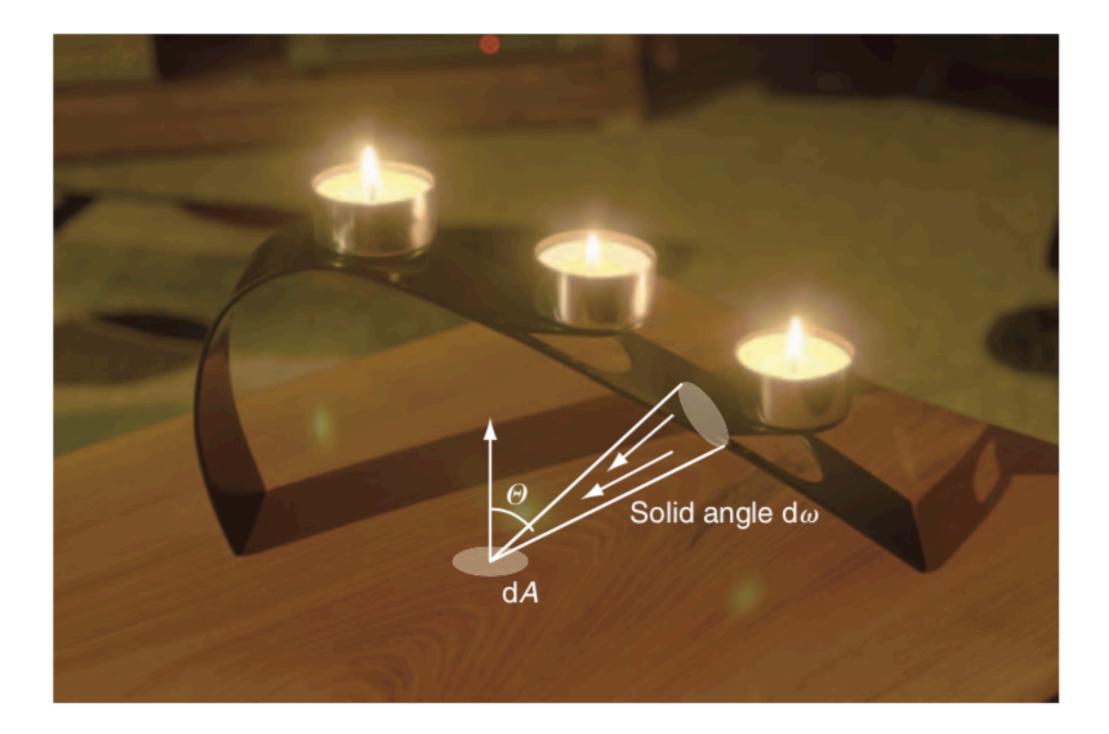

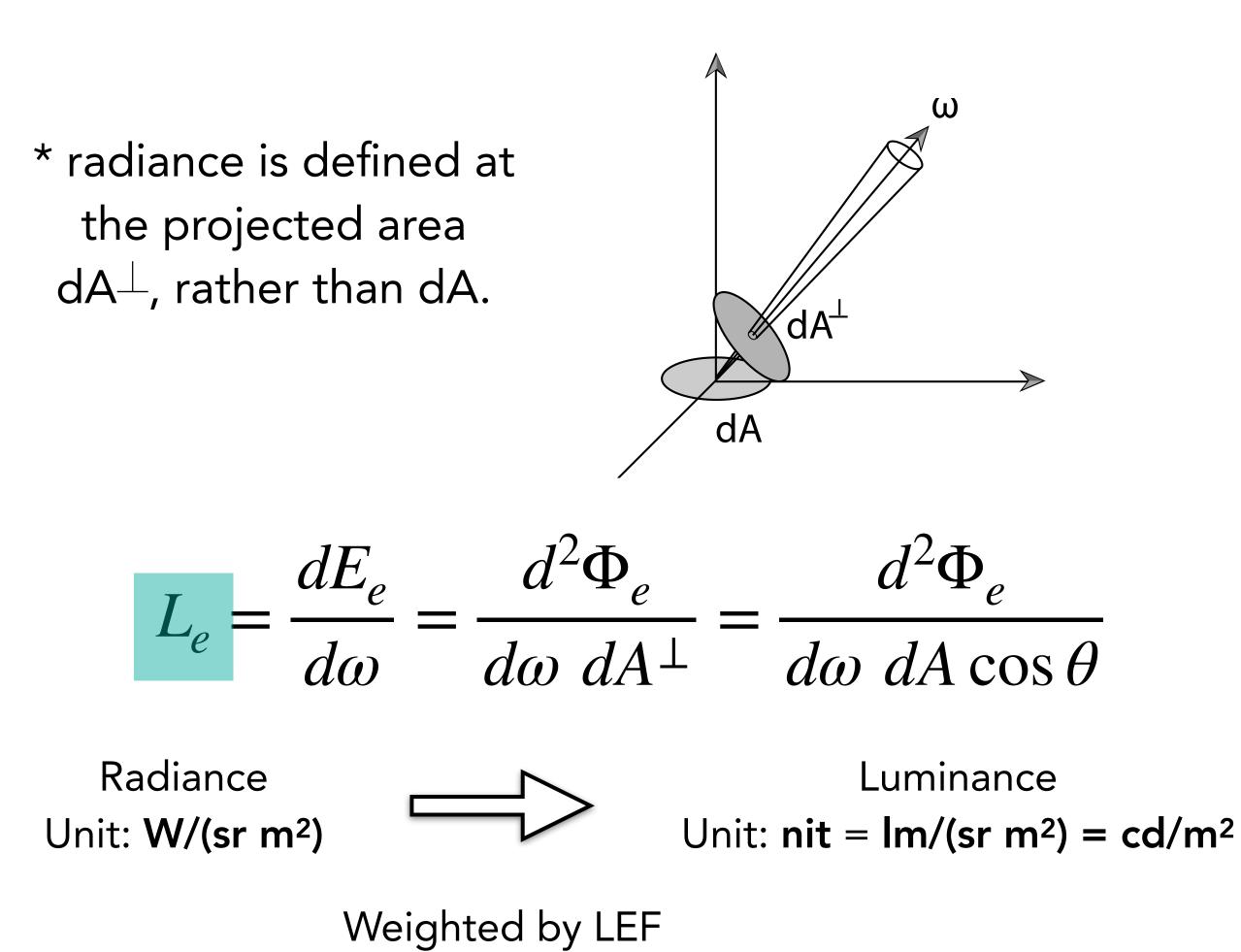




Radiance = Irradiance Per Unit Solid Angle

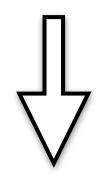

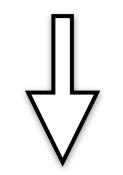

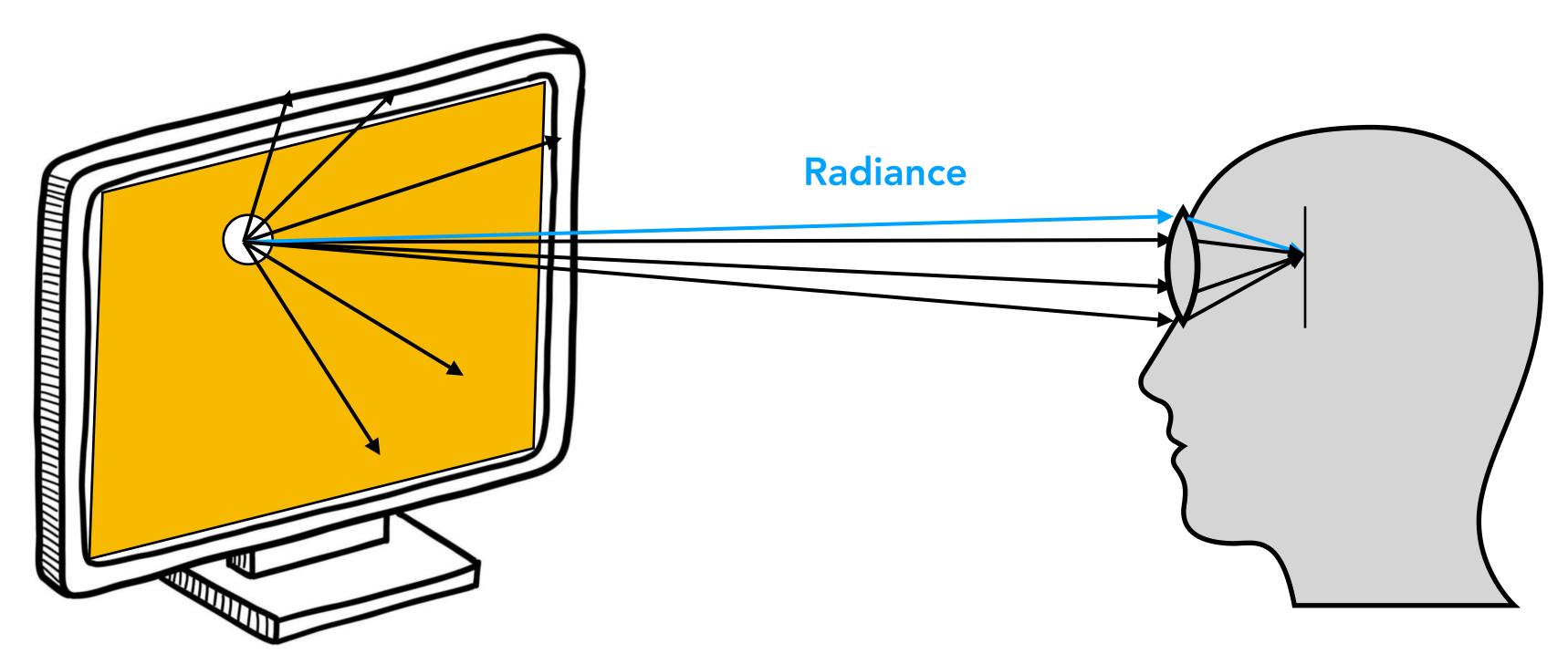

Radiance is Usually What We Care About



Each point on the display is emitting lights to the entire hemisphere, but only a small bundle of rays from each pixel actually enter our eyes/camera system. • From radiance and the angle subtended by the eye we can calculate the irradiance of any point on the retina and the power of any photoreceptor/pixel given its area.

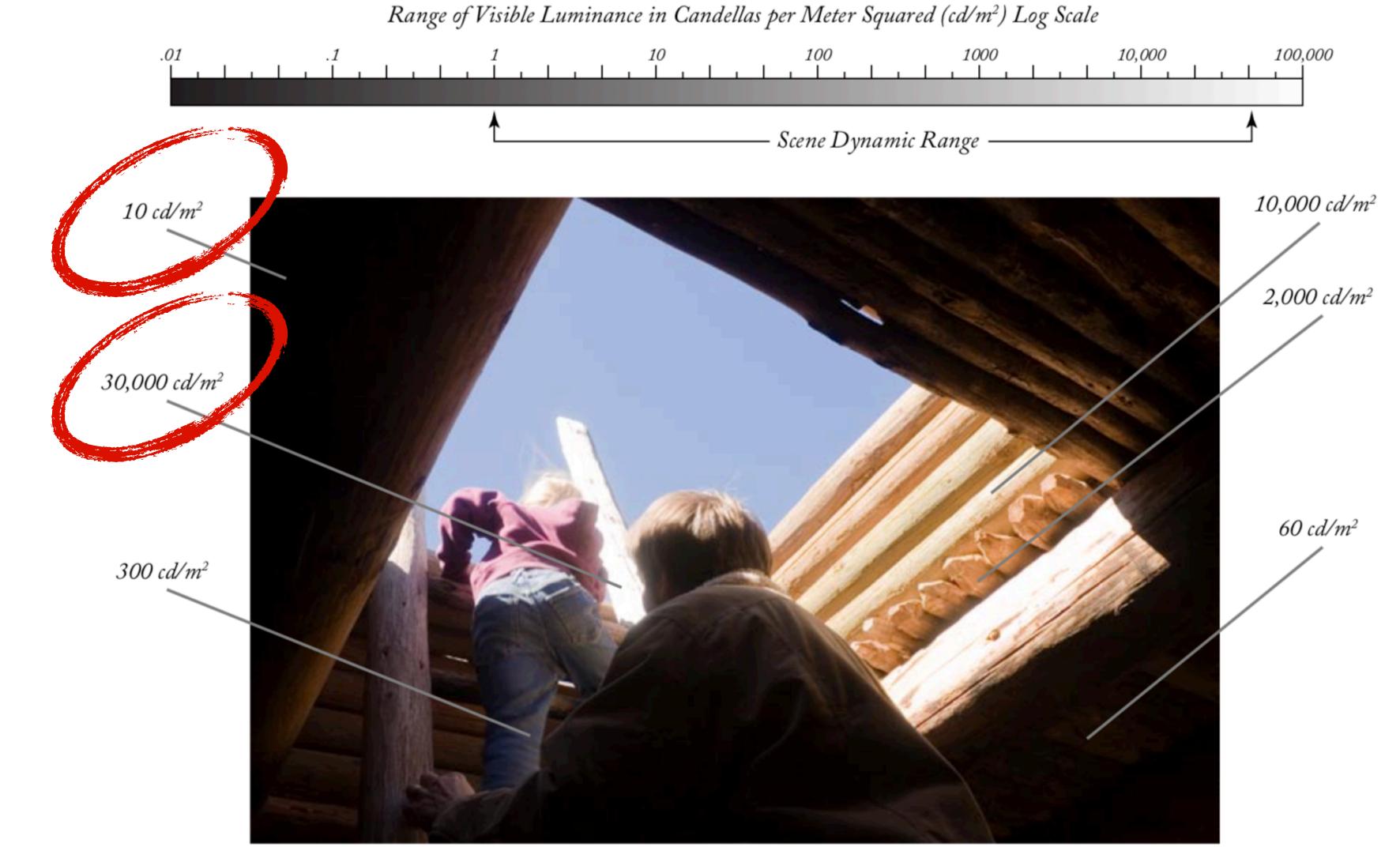

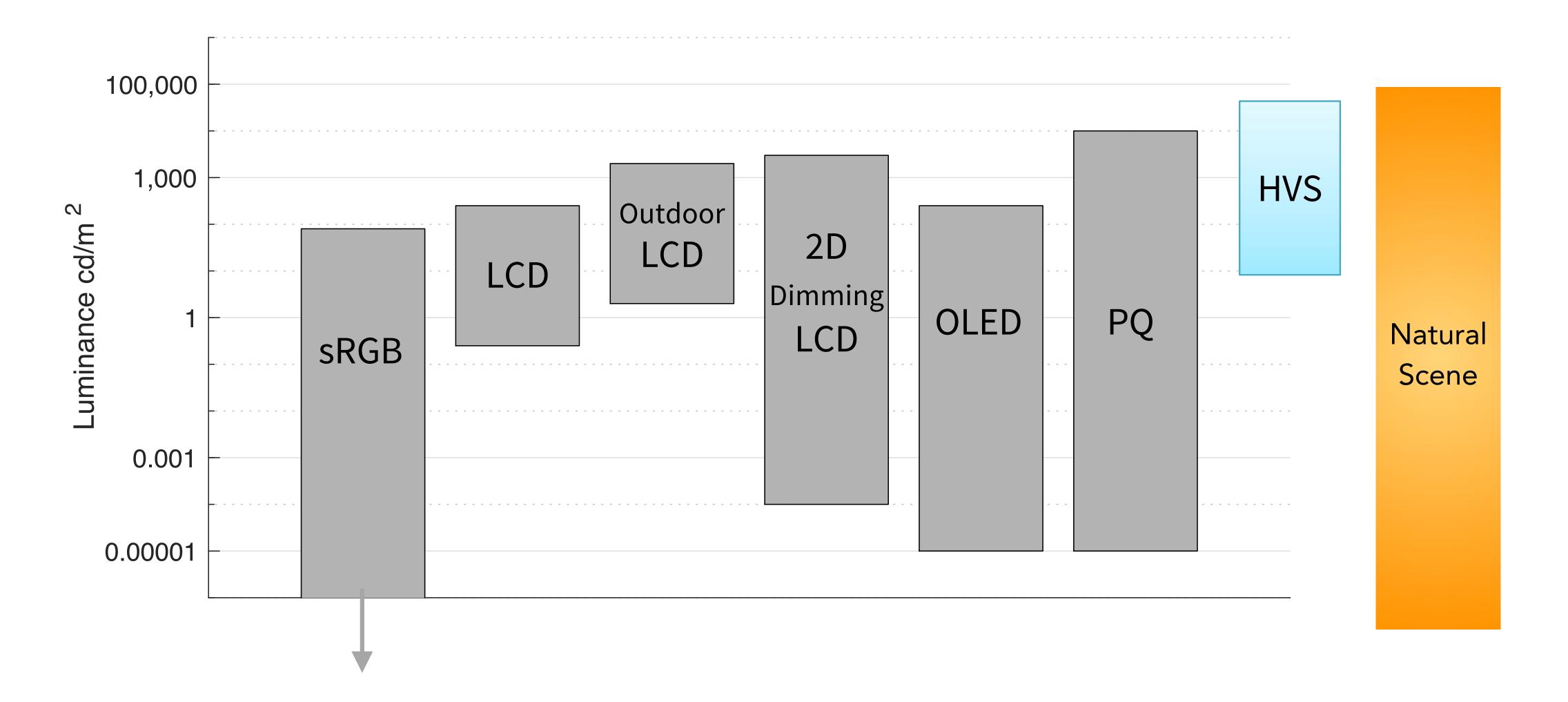

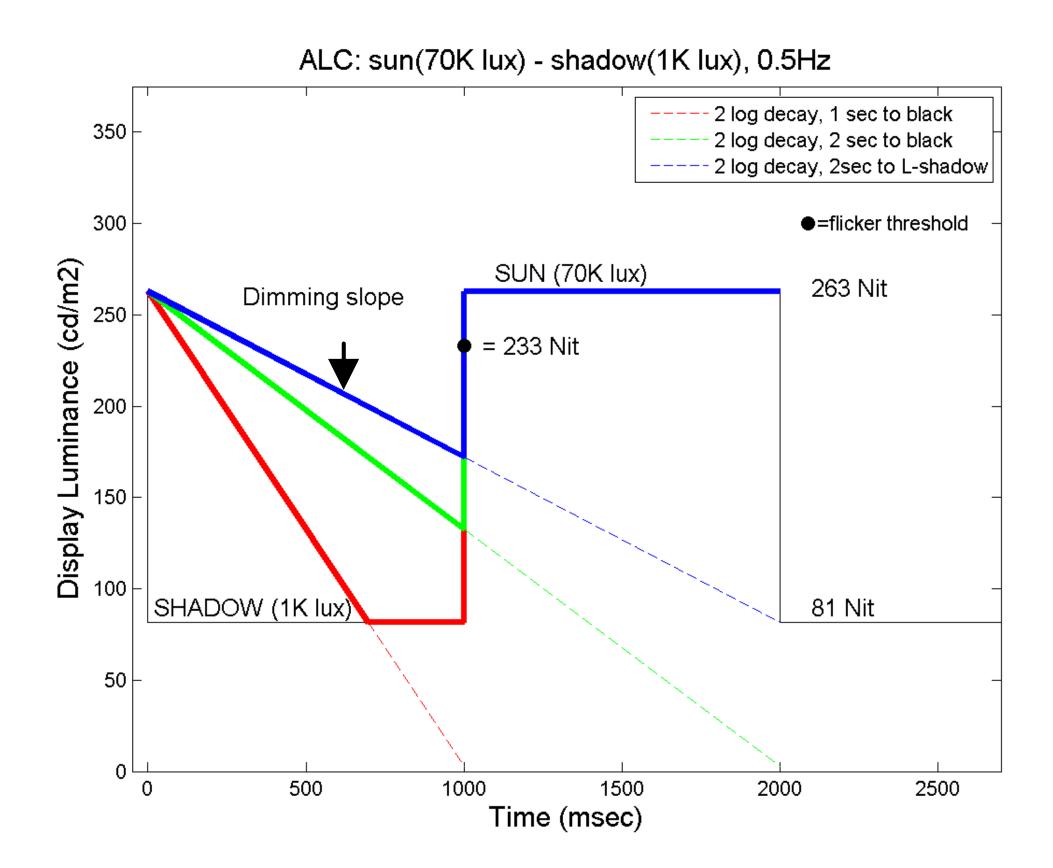

When external illumination is high, increase the display luminance because: 1) unwanted reflectance from display is high and 2) your eye "exposure time" is shorter.

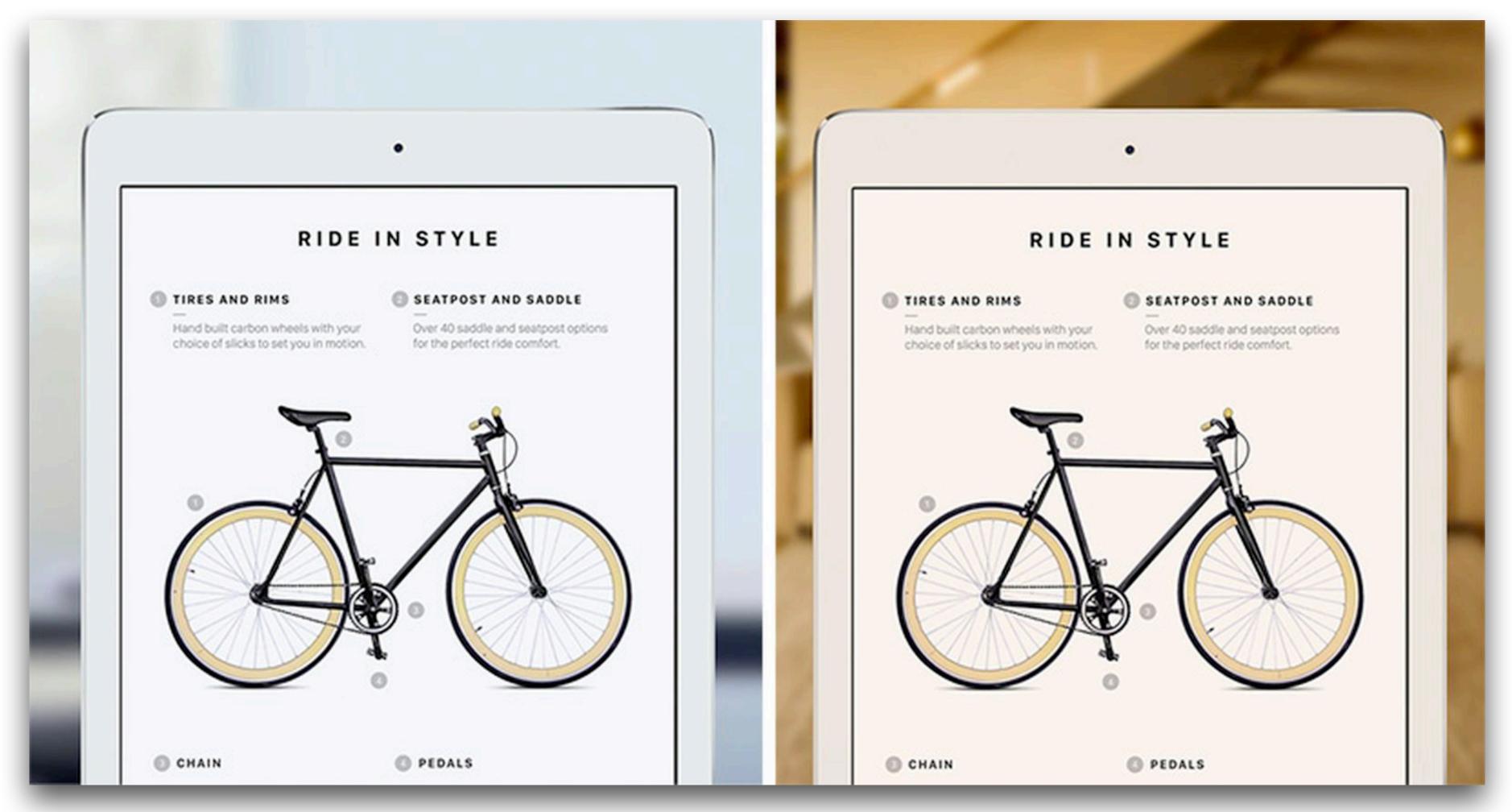






Related: Apple TrueTone

TrueTone adjusts the white point of the display. It's related to chromatic adaption of human visual system and camera white balance. More later in the class.

Things to Take Away

Displays and lighting systems serve fundamentally different purposes.

- For displays we care about the color reproduction quality.
- For lighting systems we care about its "color rendering" quality.
