Course description The purpose of this course is to introduce the fundamentals of probability theory. The goal is to introduce the fundamental concepts such as events, probability spaces, random variables, expectation, independence, conditioning, discrete and continuous random variables and distributions, and distribution functions. Then we introduce various limit theorems and their applications such as central limit theorem and versions of laws of large numbers. Finally we discuss some important random processes, random walks and Markov chains and some of their applications (if time permits).

Class format The lectures will be presented on black board. Attendance is not mandatory but highly encouraged since most of the motivating material will not be found in the primary resource.

Prerequisites The students must be comfortable with calculus, and understanding and writing rigorous proofs.

Learning objectives

- Understanding basic probabilistic techniques and be able to apply them when building suitable probabilistic models for applications
- Understanding various important probabilistic concepts such as independence and conditioning
- Understand and be able to use various limit theorems such as laws of large numbers and central limit theorem.
