- We want to analyze code for the presence of exceptional values
- Will this expression ever yield  $\pm \inf$  or NaN?
  - can also be stated as "Will this variable ..."

  - as special encodings in (g, e, s)?

- How should we handle rounding and normalization that is present in FP?

Which of these operations produce exceptional values?

- Not acceptable
  - Plain English semantics
  - Non-mathematical semantics e.g., using programming language notation

  - *a* \* *b* + *c*
  - Common in matrix multiply implementations
- How are exceptional values handled?
- What are the combinations?
- Aside: Tensor cores

  - Incorrect semantics
  - Missing semantics
- Good news:
  - FP is implemented by hardware
  - FP semantics is formalized in SMT
- How can we use these to check?
