Fellous & Arbib ch. 12, Arbib - Beware the pessionate robot

- Robots, unlike Arbib himself, shouldn't have fits of pique, leading to rudeness & possible dire consequence neuromodulation
- · Function of emotion: biasing toward rapid (dopamine, commitment to action (vs. more cautions appraised)
- Our most powerful emotions are rooted in basic <u>drives</u> (the "4 F s"), rather than expected/learned rewards & punishments. Such "heated emotiones" may be mappropriate for robots. ONR (ch.7) Leave out the "heat"; Rolls too focused on +reward -punisht

- objects to Fellows & Ledenx's claim that consciousness ~ norking memory (also BARVS?)

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- objects to Rolls' hypothesis that monitoring of "if-then" rules is dependent on language

- empathy: Ne comprehend other minds by simulation => empathic emotional response Lexcept in sociopaths? Marie Bresnard..]

- world graph model of the rat (with Liellick '77) [Maze-running model?] current-situation model, in prefrontal cortex; but "where am I" (current spatial context) is represented in the hippocampus [*F. London taxi drivers]

- Robots will have "functional niches" & their dispositions & reward systems should be adapted to these.

incidental - rats & lever pressing (hypothelanic electrodes) "wireheading" Evould robots manipulate their own reward variables?]

The opening story showed that for people, emotions can have bad consequences (cf. massacres in the news...). So we don't want that kind of "heated" emotion in robots... restrict them to "cautions appraisals".

Arbib urges a goal-oriented design, balancing the need for rapid commitment to action with more careful evaluation
